## House hearings set in Salem

The House Ways and Means Health Subcommittee will conduct hearings in Salem May 6 and 7 to discuss the development of a comprehensive national health care program for all citizens. The hearings are to be chaired by Dan Rostenkowski (D-Ill.), and Congressman Al Ullman is expected to attend.

Oregon has been selected as

one of five states in which the hearings will be held. The hearings will entertain public testimony concerning the inability of our present medical system to meet health care needs.

## Talk planned on technology

Phil Bereano, teacher of the program on Social Management of Technology at the University of Washington, will give a talk entitled "The Transition to Intermediate Technology" today at 12:30 p.m. in the EMU Forum room.

The intermediate technology issue provides an important link to the notion of cooperative enterprises. One of the motives behind decentralization is more human control over technology, which is difficult except for a top few managers in large scale, hierarchically organized enterprises to achieve. On Thursday afternoon the

focus will turn to job-sharing, a policy whereby those who desire to can share a job with another person but be employed on a permanent basis. Fringe benefits also would be split by the job-sharers. Linda Schuck of "New Ways to Work in Palo Alto" will be talking about her experiences while implementing job-sharing for city workers in Palo Alto at 3:30 in the EMU Forum Room.

This evening there will be a panel on job-sharing featuring a number of people holding differing opinions with regard to the issue. Aside from Schuck, the participants will be Therese Engelmann, a local attorney; Nancie Fadeley, a state legislator; Irv Fletcher of the Lane Labor Council and Janice Marshall, a doctoral student in political science at the University who is doing her dissertation on job-sharing. The panel is scheduled to take place at 7:30 in 167 EMU.

All of the programs for the week are free and the public is encouraged to attend.
