Oregon signed its second high school All-American gymnast from Illinois Wednesday.

Breck Grigas, from Hinsdale, Ill., inked a national letter-of-intent to compete for the Ducks.

Grigas scored 53.45 points in finishing second in the all-around competition at the National High School Invitational recently, making him the highest scoring all-around man Oregon has ever had.

The winner of the event Bart Connors, is considered the best young gymnast in the world.

Grigas was a prep all-American in four events — the rings, high bar, parallel bars and all-around.

Last week the Ducks signed high school All-American Gene Christensen, from Elk Grove, Ill.

Ducks sweep two from Beavers

CORVALLIS — Who says women's softball can't be interesting?

The Oregon women's softball squad, in perhaps its most satisfying win, came back from a Tuesday home defeat to sweep a double header from Oregon State, 7-3 and 3-2, in a three-game series to determine a qualifier for the AIAW-sanctioned Women's College World Series May 13-16 in Omaha, Neb.

The Ducks, 5-1 losers to OSU in Eugene, spaced three singles by Debi Segura, Allyson Smith and Shawna Baxter between walks to score six runs in the fourth for the big inning in the first game.

Then, with the series tied 1-1, Oregon reserve pitcher Connie Anderson whacked a double with bases loaded and two out to score three runs in the third inning of the second contest. The Beavers got two runs in the fourth, but couldn't quite make up the deficit.

Shawna Baxter, who was on the mound for Oregon in all three games, didn't let the earlier loss bother her as she pitched 14 straight innings against OSU.

"I'm used to pitching that many

games," said Baxter. "My arm was a bit sore from a pulled muscle, but I just tried to get it across the plate.

"It was a total team effort," she continued. "It wasn't just one person for sure."

Oregon, now with undisputably one of the best women's programs in the Northwest, has had six squads qualify for national competition this year — cross country, gymnastics, field hockey, volleyball, swimming and now softball.

Softball coach Becky Sisley, however, was very happy with her team's play in the second game.

"That was really a tight game — even back and forth," said Sisley. "People were really on their toes. They didn't let the errors in the first

game bother them (the Ducks had six) because they knew it didn't matter."

Anderson's timely double, though, drew the most praise.

"Connie had a really nice, long hit," said the Oregon coach. "It certainly came at the right time. She played heads-up — everyone played heads-up."

The Ducks' JV team didn't have as much luck at OSU, however, as it lost its first game of the season 3-9 to the Beaver JV's.

Judge nixes Shelton suit

PORTLAND (AP) — Judge Gus J. Solomon of the U.S. District court dismissed Tuesday the \$2 million suit filed by former Oregon State University basketball player Lonnie Shelton against the Spirits of St. Louis of the American Basketball Association.

The suit was dismissed partly on grounds Shelton is not a citizen of Oregon. Portland lawyers representing Shelton said the suit would be filed in St. Louis, where Shelton signed a \$1.2 million contract with the Spirits in June 1975.

The suit says Shelton was "induced to sign by fraud and misrep-

resentation." It asks that the contract be declared void as well as that damages be awarded.

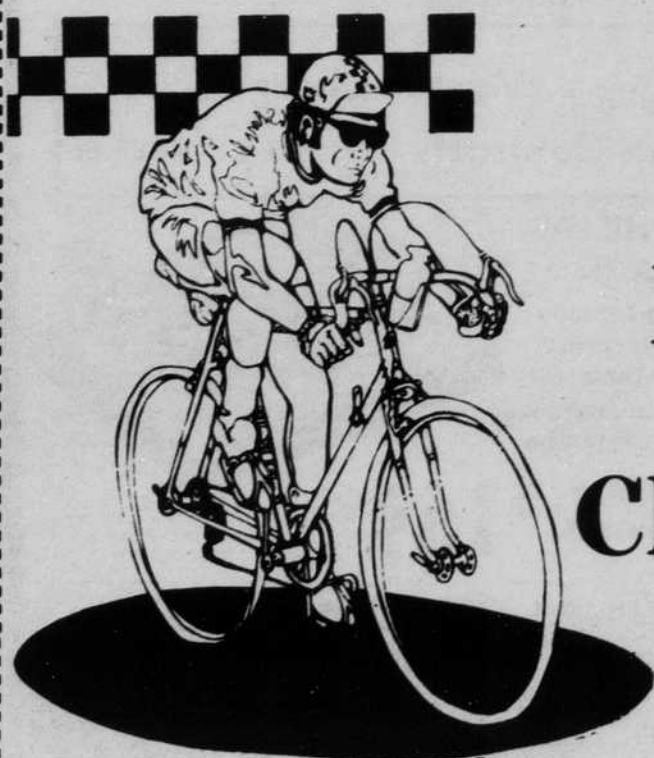
John King, a St. Louis lawyer who represents the Spirits, said the suit might be out of place in St. Louis, too, since the Spirits have closed their office there and are trying to relocate in a city where they might get better attendance at games.

Shelton, who became ineligible to play college basketball after the dispute over his professional contract, has applied for the National Basketball Association hardship draft, since his class has not graduated from OSU.
