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Ducks 'mediocre' on first 18 in Arizona

SCOTTSDALE, ARIZ. — Oregon fought the blahs due mainly to 90 degree weather during the first round of the Sun Devil-Phoenix Thunderbird Golf Classic at McCormick Ranch yesterday and found itself 12th in a field of 19 after 18 holes.

"We had a mediocre day," admitted UO coach Jim Ferguson, "but we're still only seven strokes out of the top five. We should be able to come back quite easily."

Brigham Young, a team which beat the Ducks in its own tournament last weekend, 13-under-par at 347 after the first round. Oregon's Pac-8 rival Stanford is runnerup with 355.

"I'm convinced we can catch Stanford by the end of this tournament," said Ferguson. The Ducks' score is an eight-over-par 368 after 18 holes.

All six Oregon golfers carded commendable scores, with team leader Peter Jacobsen and Rod Livesay leading the way with par-72s. The top five individual scores count toward each team's total in this 54-hole event.

State Board shuns action on athletic aid proposal

PORTLAND — The State Board of Higher Education made no definite decision Thursday whether intercollegiate athletic programs at Oregon, Oregon State and Portland State will be recommended to receive state financing.

The board appointed a five-member sub-committee to investigate the proposal, which would "permit the major revenue-

producing activities...to be self-supporting" and "encourage the use of student incidental fees and state general fund support to enable the 'other' athletic activities to survive in the face of the raising cost of doing business."

The proposal was drawn up by Roy Lieuellen, chancellor of the State System of Higher Education, and, if accepted, would inject some \$400,000 into the athletic departments of the three schools.

Ali predicts Young KO

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Muhammad Ali, confident as always but bigger than ever, predicted Thursday he would knock out Jimmy Young but said he didn't know what round.

It might depend on how worried his manager, Herbert Muhammad, gets.

"He worries real bad," said Ali after weighing in at 230, the high-

est official weight of his career, for his scheduled 15-round title defense Friday night at the Capital Centre.

Herbert Muhammad worried to the point that he left his seat during the Ali-Jean Pierre Coopman fight in Puerto Rico Feb. 20 and went to the ring to tell Ali to stop playing. Coopman went out in the fifth round.

But Young, although a definite underdog, is considered a stiffer test for Ali than was Coopman.

"He can give me as much trouble as Ken Norton," said Ali. "He can box better. He's faster but I don't know if he can take it."

Then the champ told how he was going to win:

"I'll sweat him down, talk to him. This is his first title fight. I'm a veteran of so many big fights."

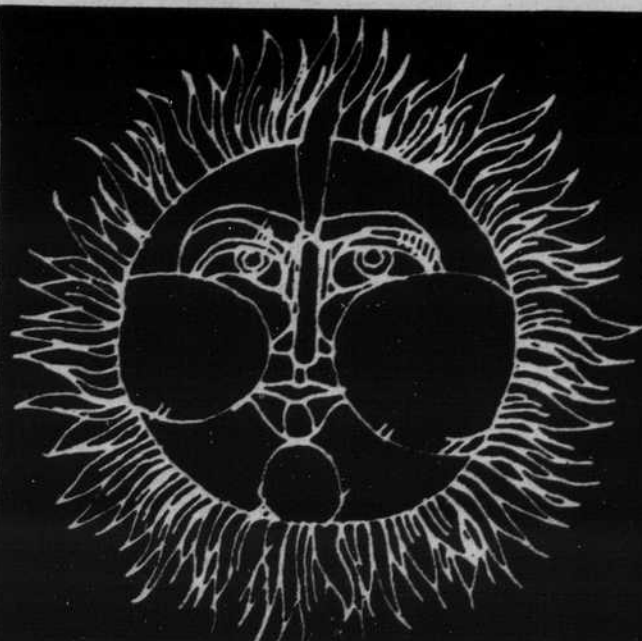


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
