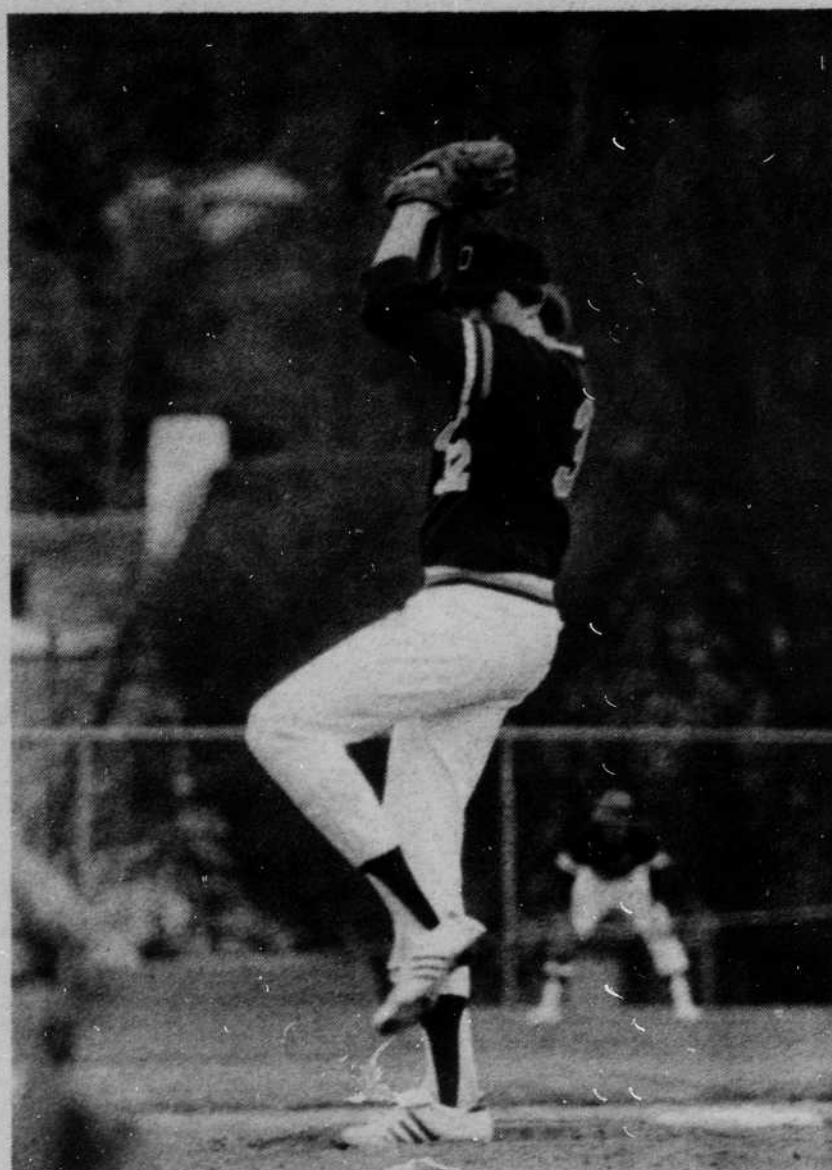
more (2-1) twirled six hitters as the Ducks swept the opening double-header 2-1 and 3-0. Freshman Jeff Heaton knocked in

Netters, track team

Women end tourneys

Oregon's women's teams had mixed results after completing two tournaments this weekend in track and field and tennis.

The track squad, second after opening day action in the Northwest College Women's Sports Association Track and Field Championships Friday in Boise, scored a host of second and third places to finish second Saturday with 78 points. The eventual winner, Seattle Pacific, totaled 139.

Oregon's two-mile relay team was the only winner for Oregon, as Jenifer Bates, Nancy Alleman, Dala Ramsey and Kim Conner finished in 9:26.1 Friday.

Other Duck performances, however, were numerous. Mary Officer went 19-5½ to break the Oregon school record Friday in the long jump, but was second to Seattle Pacific's Sharron Walker, who marked 19-9¼.

Karen Marshall finished second in discus competition with a toss of 144-4½ Friday, then went on to take third in the shot put the next day with a mark of 45-9½.

Other Oregon standouts were Kim Conner, third in the mile (5:01.8); the Duck 440 relay team, second at 48.7 and Officer, who also placed second in the 100-meter hurdles in 14.4.

The tennis team, meanwhile, slipped from a first-day leading

spot to finish fourth in the NCWSA Southern Area Tennis Championships held here Friday and Saturday. The Ducks, who had three singles and two doubles teams going into the championships, settled for 51 points behind Lewis and Clark (52), Southern Oregon (56) and the team winner, Oregon State, with 62 points.

Ex-Duck Daggatt lays charges

Ducks win relays; Dellinger gets flak

CORVALLIS — Oregon, with a partial squad competing, out-scored three other schools to win with 96 points in the Northern Division Relays here Saturday.

Washington State was second with 69, with third place going to Washington (65). After that came OSU (58), Oregon Track Club (37) and sixth was Spokane CC with 23.

Although the meet was somewhat of a break for some athletes, several good marks came in the hot afternoon. OSU's Scott Fisher set an outdoor lifetime best in the pole vault as he cleared 16-9, with Oregon vaulters Craig Brigham and Tinker Hatfield both going 16-3 for a respective second and third places. (Brigham finished second on fewer misses.)

Hammer thrower Rich Perkins again cleared 200 feet by winning the hammer with a mark of 204-0.

Others just missed Olympic qualifying times. Paul Geis won the 10,000 in 28:43.67, just missing the standard of 28:40.0. Washington State's Josh Kimeto,

meanwhile, came closer but still missed as he won the 5,000 in 13:40.81. The qualifying time is 13:40.00.

Unfortunately, the focus of the meet settled on controversy rather than individual triumphs. Former Duck distance man Scott Daggatt, now of the OTC, accused Oregon head coach Bill Dellinger of hampering his efforts to qualify for the Olympics.

Daggatt said Dellinger got him "blackballed" from a race last week in San Jose, then sing-

lehandedly prevented the mile from being changed to a 1,500 meters in the relays to keep him from qualifying. Daggatt dropped out of the mile at the 1,500 mark after failing by about three seconds to meet the Olympic 1,500 standard of 3:40.6.

Dellinger, however, branded the San Jose charge "ridiculous." As for the motion to change the mile, the Duck coach, who was in favor of the motion, was outvoted 3-1 in a Friday night coaches meeting prior to the meet.

Duck stars gain awards

Ron Lee, Oregon basketball standout for four years and Jack Henderson, junior football quarterback, were presented awards Saturday at the Parents' Weekend all-campus breakfast held in the EMU.

Lee won the Emerald Athletic Award, sponsored jointly by the Oregon Daily Emerald and the athletic department for athletic accomplishment, service and scholarship.

Henderson was awarded the Dolye Higdon Memorial Trophy, co-sponsored by the sophomore and junior classes, on the basis of excellence in athletics, scholarship and citizenship.

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
