Top architect to lecture today

Portland architect Richard Campbell will discuss his architectural work in a free public lecture today at 8 p.m. in Room 177 Lawrence.

Campbell is a partner in the Portland firm of Campbell, Yost, Grube and Partners.

Campbell was named one of the six top Portland designers in a survey of architects' opinions conducted recently by the Portland newspaper *Willamette Week*.

Stanford prof to present talk

An educator who has labeled decision making processes in colleges and universities as "organized anarchy" and "disjointed incrementalism" will present a guest lecture at the University on Thursday.

James March, currently David Jacks professor of higher education, political science and sociology at Stanford University, will deliver a talk entitled "Cruel World and Clever Organization" at 3 p.m. in Room 167 of the EMU.

March is often quoted for his studies of university decision making processes.

From now through June 4, the University Library will offer an experimental term paper advisory service. Any student will be eligible who is undertaking a term project involving library research and has decided on a general topic in consultation with his instructor.

Students may request the service either at the general reference desk or in one of the subject divisions. After an initial screening interview, the student will be given a half-hour appointment with a librarian knowledgeable in the literature of his topic. The two can then arrange whatever followup appears appropriate.

The offering of this special term paper service should in no way discourage students and faculty from seeking other types of consultation with library subject specialists as they have been accustomed to doing.
