

Fund provides employe tuition

A special endowed fund has been established to provide tuition, fees and books for University classified employes who wish to further their education in career development at the University either at the undergraduate or graduate level.

The fund, which will be managed by the Development Fund, is one of the special projects to which faculty and staff may contribute during the current Campus Second Century Drive.

Candidates for the scholarship must be regularly employed as full-time classified employes of the University, currently enrolled or intending to enroll as a part-time or full-time student at the University.

Recipients will be chosen by a committee consisting of classified employes appointed by the vice-president for administration and

finance. The committee will be representative of a cross section of all University classified employes.

Another goal of the Second Century Fund Campus Drive is to provide educational opportunity for members of the families of University employes. Establishment of "Family Scholarships," however, will depend on the interest expressed during the campaign by University faculty and staff.

Film director to present talk

Award-winning director Victoria Hochberg will screen her new film "Metroliner" and give an informal talk tonight at 7:30 in 107 Lawrence.

Hochberg, who was nominated for a 1974 Emmy award for her direction of the ABC special "The Right to Die," will be speaking on campus as part of the University's series of centennial lectures fol-

lowing the theme "The Northwest Passage Into the 21st Century."

"Metroliner" is a 35-minute film that traces the journey of an Amtrak high-speed train from New York to Washington, D.C. It has been described as a cinematic poem about the motion of a train, a tribute to the people who make the train move and a comment on America's social and political past.

As a producer-director of television specials, Hochberg's credits include "To Be Young, Gifted and Black," "Hollywood: You Must Remember This" and "Woman's Place" as well as "The Right to Die." "Metroliner" is her first film and was financed with a grant from the American Film Institute.

Hochberg will also meet with students at an informal coffee hour at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday in the Honors College Lounge in the basement of Friendly Hall.

Artist to give feminist show

Judy Chicago, a feminist artist and lecturer, will deliver a slide-illustrated presentation on "Feminist Art" at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in Gerlinger Hall Alumni Lounge. The program is open without charge to the public.

Chicago teaches in a San Francisco community art program and is the author of a published autobiography entitled, "Through the Flower," which chronicles her efforts to become an artist.

Author to talk on labor rights

Sidney Peck, labor educator, author of "The Rank and File Leader," and sociology professor at Clark University in Massachusetts, will be speaking at a public meeting sponsored by the Lane County Labor Council Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in Harris Hall, 8th Avenue and Oak Street.

Nellie Fox, political director of the Oregon state AFL-CIO, will join Peck to discuss labor's right to education. They will focus on the

role education can play in helping working people solve the problems confronting them in the 1970s.

Also on the program will be Roy Lieuallen, chancellor of the Oregon State System of Higher Education. He will be discussing the many challenges presently facing higher education and his projections for the future.

The meeting will be open for questions and discussion from the audience following brief presentations by each panelist.

Feedback sets wilderness show

"The Public Right to the Wilderness" will be the subject for a half-hour television discussion at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday on the Oregon Education and Public Broadcasting System.

The discussion will be on the weekly OEPBS-TV series, "Feedback," broadcast on PL-3, Eugene; KOAP-TV, Portland, and KOAC-TV, Corvallis.

Originating live from the University, the program will feature host Vern Mueller and guests Ed Diller, director of the University Honors College, and Nancy Duhnkrack of the University Outdoor Program.

Diller and Duhnkrack are working with an Oregon Committee for the Humanities project to sponsor workshops dealing with the problems and issues of American wilderness.

"Feedback" offers viewers an opportunity to telephone their questions and concerns directly to guest panelist.

Concert starts Udall campaign

The Oregon presidential campaign for Morris Udall will begin in Eugene with a fund-raising con-

cert Tuesday at 9 p.m. at the Community Center for the Performing Arts, 8th Avenue and Lincoln Street.

Stone Ground, a group from San Francisco, will perform and proceeds will go to the Oregon '76 Udall campaign. Tickets will be \$2 per person. A bake sale will be held prior to the concert.

Udall has announced that he will campaign vigorously in Oregon. He will arrive in Portland Wednesday and is expected to make appearances in Eugene the week prior to the May 25 primary.
