

### Aid offers late

Because of a computer failure at the Oregon State Scholarship Commission, financial aid award offers for the 1976-77 academic year will be sent out on May 26, one week later than anticipated. This change will effect all four-year state institutions.

In keeping with the new schedule, the Office of Student Financial Aid will again have to shift its open hours. The office will be open from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. all this week, but closed next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, May 24 to 26. Counselors will be unable to see students at any time through May 26.

### Hearing tonight on rent hike

A public hearing to discuss the proposed rent increase for married student housing will be held tonight from 7 to 10 p.m. in 101 EMU.

The proposed increase, ranging from \$6 to \$10 per month would take effect July 1 for the Amazon and Westmoreland housing projects.

Amazon Cooperative Tenants (ACT) have said they will voice objections to the rent increase and present a plan to form a management cooperative at this meeting.

ACT has enlisted the efforts of a Eugene auditing firm in the planning of their proposed cooperative. They have also consulted

Roger Auerbach, a Portland cooperative consultant from the Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group, to discuss the feasibility of a management cooperative for the Amazon Housing Project.

All interested persons are invited to attend the hearing.

### Jail slide show slated for EMU

An informational slide show on the proposed Lane County jail facility will be held in the EMU breezeway today, Thursday, Friday and Monday.

The 15-minute slide show will be run from 2 to 3 p.m. each day

and will illustrate the present condition of the jail and the problems those conditions create. It will also discuss the proposed jail measure and will feature possible architectural models for a new jail. Students and volunteers will conduct the slide show and will be available to answer questions.

### School plans jazz program

An "Evening of Vocal Jazz" will be presented Wednesday at 7:30 p.m., in the South Eugene High School auditorium.

The program will feature groups from Cottage Grove High School, directed by Caleb Standofer; Sheldon High School, directed by

Glenn Patton; South Eugene High School, directed by James DeBusman; Lane Community College, directed by Terry Gilliam; and the University Vocal Jazz Ensemble, directed by Dan Sachs.

Admission is \$1. Proceeds will go toward sending high school students to summer music camps.

### Busterud to talk on timber policy

A member of the President's Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ), John Busterud, will give a free public talk Wednesday at the University on "The Seaton Report Revisited: A Forward Looking Timber Policy for America."

Busterud will speak at a 4:30 p.m. seminar of the biology department in 123 Science I. A tea will follow in 361 Science I.

An attorney, Busterud is presently U.S. Senior Environmental Adviser to the Economic Commission for Europe and chairer of the Legal and Administrative Measures Area under the U.S.—USSR Environmental Agreement.

He was the first deputy assistant secretary of defense for environmental quality, from September 1971 to October 1972. He has served on the CEQ since October 1972. Busterud graduated with a bachelor's degree, cum laude, in economics from the University in 1943.



### Library features map display

Maps depicting the westward movement of settlers to Oregon are now on display in the University Library.

The display, in the showcases at the main circulation desk, includes maps of individual Midwest states where many early Oregon settlers originated. Two maps used by pioneers to guide them over the Oregon Trail and various maps of Oregon and its communities also are included.

Ed Thatcher, map librarian, organized the maps to commemorate the University's centennial celebration.

One of the originals was engraved to appear in a book published in 1778 detailing the travels of Jonathan Carver. Another original was done by U.S. topographical engineers on an expedition in 1842-44.

"Most of those early maps were purchased for from 60 cents to \$1.25, but might be sold for a thousand times that in New York now," says Thatcher.

The Carver expedition makes the first reference to Oregon on a map. It spells the territory "Origan" and refers to the "River of the West," now known as the Columbia River.

The entire collection will be on display throughout the month of May. It can be viewed during regular library hours. The library is open from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m., Monday through Thursday; Fridays from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.; Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Sundays from 2 to 11 p.m.
