

Brown worker stops in Eugene

"We are just beginning to realize the limits to growth," states Claire Dedrick. "We are rapidly approaching the point of exhaustion of our natural resources."

Speaking to a University environmental issues class, Dedrick said she feels that only California Gov. Jerry Brown Jr. is capable of facing the tough environmental questions that must be answered by the nation's next president. According to her, Brown challenges the conventional methods of "government by crisis," largely because he has no political debts to pay.

As the secretary of natural resources for the state of California, Dedrick has been closely involved

with the Brown administration and its re-ordering of priorities for California's 22 million people. An environmental activist for 10 years and a former board member of the Sierra Club, she pointed out what she considers are inconsistencies of a recent National League of Conservation Voters rating of presidential candidates. The report, which labeled Jimmy Carter and Mo Udall as outstanding but rated Brown as only fair on environmental issues, "was plain uninformed and unfair," she said.

She stated that the Brown administration believes in limited government and limited resources. She said it also has taken the emphasis away from a

pure growth ethic to the search for what type of growth and preservation is best in the long run.

What is most attractive to many people, she continued, is that the people who are implementing these philosophical guidelines within the Brown administration are those who were formerly outside of government and are aware of limits.

women and environmentalists who have been brought into the governmental process in unprecedented numbers," Dedrick stated. "Working within the bureaucracy, these gubernatorial appointees have quietly wrought a number of major changes in the last 18 months."

One of two women appointed to Brown's four-member cabinet, Dedrick said if Brown were nominated and elected president, he would bring new faces to the government that would be able to foresee problems and find solutions before they reached crisis proportions.

If nothing else comes from his late starting campaign, Dedrick said she believes Brown has raised issues that will bring the ideas rather than personalities back into the campaign. And Dedrick concluded that even if the Brown momentum does not materialize in time to sweep him into the White House, he'll always be a good trout fisherman.
