

Aides say Brown may win Oregon

PORTLAND (AP) — Aides to Edmund Brown Jr. now say a clear victory is possible for the California governor in Tuesday's Oregon primary election.

But Brown still says he faces an uphill battle in his late-starting write-in campaign. Brown, Jimmy Carter and Idaho Sen. Frank Church have campaigned extensively in Oregon for Democratic presidential nomination. Carter, Church and eight others are on the Democratic ballot in the state. Brown is not.

Brown aide Llew Werner said the California governor will spend about \$100,000 in Oregon. His media blitz included a full-page advertisement in Sunday's Portland *Oregonian*, the state's largest newspaper, explaining how to write in Brown's name on the ballot.

Brown launched a two-day whirlwind campaign through eight Oregon cities Sunday with a visit to the Vancouver Avenue First Baptist Church in the predominantly black Albina district of Portland.

Brown was praised by The Rev. O.B. Williams for naming 59 blacks to positions in his two-year-old administration as governor.

In a brief talk, Brown told about 100 persons his familiar theme, that his top priority is putting America back to work.

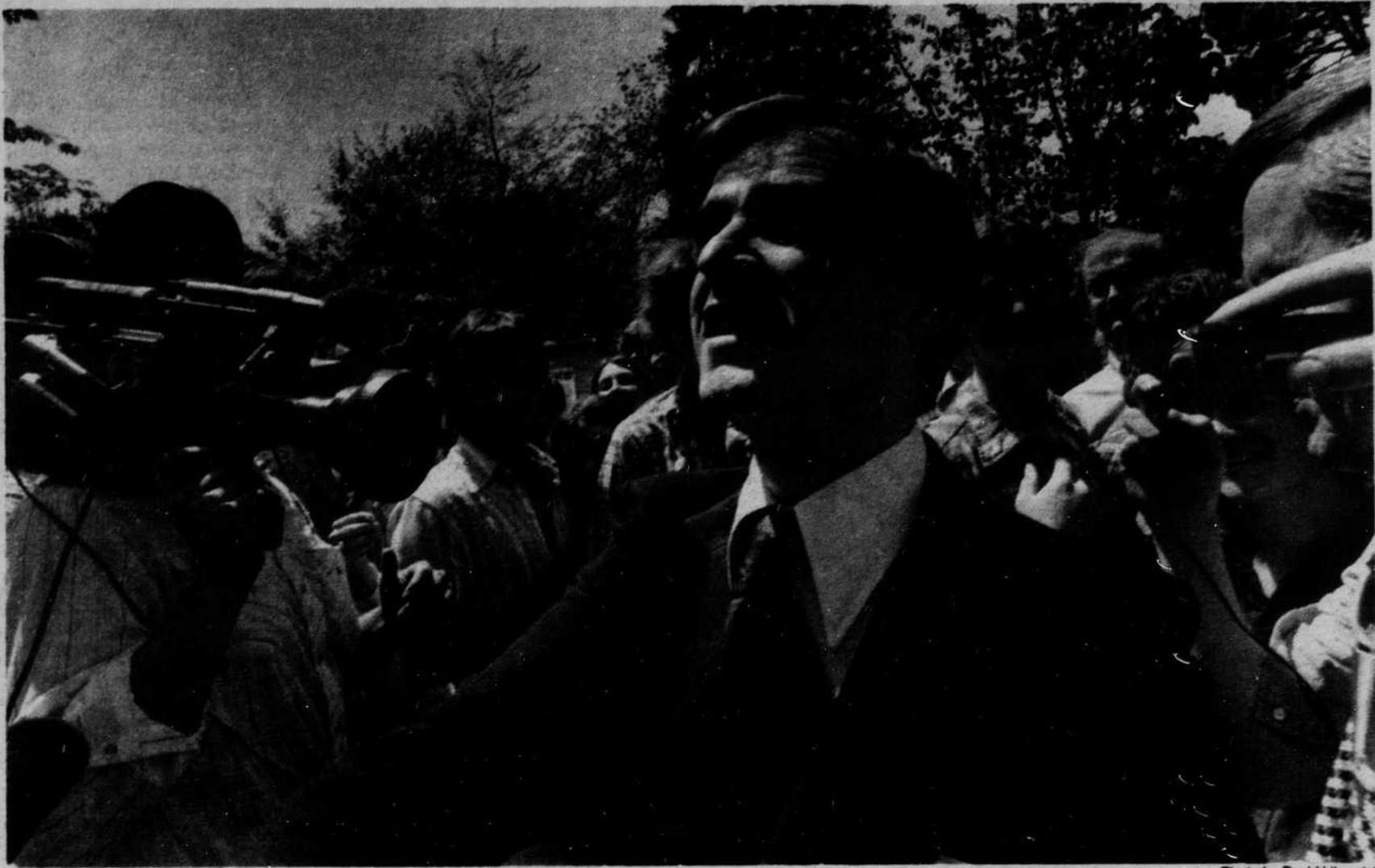

Sunday in Bend, Roseburg and Coos Bay. Today, he plans to meet with labor leaders in Coos Bay before going onto rallies at Southern Oregon State College in Ashland, appearances in Klamath Falls, a rally at Oregon State University in Corvallis and a swing through Salem before returning to Portland tonight.

Prof receives speech award

Bower Aly, a University professor emeritus of speech, recently received the 1976 Elizabeth G. Andersch Award, the highest honor given a communicator by the University of Ohio's interpersonal communication school. Aly is presently a visiting professor at Kent State University and received the honor during Ohio University's eighth annual Communication Week.

A scholar of the history of criticism of public address and rhetoric, Aly was recognized as a "respected scholar, author and distinguished professor." He was also cited as a "dedicated teacher esteemed by students of all ages for his enduring contributions to high school and college forensics."

Aly is a past president of the Speech Communication Association of America and secured the organization's 1975 Distinguished Service Award. He has written a dozen books and several articles and was editor of the *Quarterly Journal of Speech* from 1951-53.
