OSPIRG picks summer interns

Five students from Oregon colleges and universities have been selected as summer interns by the Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group (OSPIRG).

The interns, selected from over 100 applicants, will conduct summer-long studies of environmental, consumer and civil rights issues.

The five are:

—Jan Chrisman, a UO law student and a former *Oregonian* reporter, will study the effectiveness of land use planning in channeling development pressures on Oregon's coast.

—Will Denecke, graduating from the UO in geography, will research the effect of the Willamette Greenway project on private lands along the Willamette River.

—Ruby Harper will continue OSPIRG's study of agribusiness in Oregon. Harper, who is studying environmental law at Northwest School of Law, also holds a B.S. in agronomy.

—Jesus Lopez, a former agricultural laborer and organizer, will study the problems of Oregon's migrant workers. Lopez is a political science major at Oregon State University.

—Freddie Segal, graduating with majors in psychology and biology from Reed College, will investigate escalating health care costs in Oregon.

Nebraska school taps CSPA prof

A University faculty member, John Kerrigan, has been named dean of the College of Public Affairs and Community Service at the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Kerrigan has been chairer of the Division of Public Affairs and International Development at the University School of Community Service and Public Affairs (CSPA) since July 1973.

He notes that the Nebraska college, established in 1972, was modeled after the University School of CSPA, which was formed in 1967.

Kerrigan's Nebraska post begins August 1. A search committee has been formed to find a replacement for him.

Kerrigan joined the University faculty in 1970 as an associate professor of public affairs. He came here from Colorado, where he was assistant director of the Bureau of Governmental Research and Service at the University of Colorado.

From 1966 to 1968, he worked with the Ford Foundation as a program specialist for the National Ministry of Municipal and Rural Affairs in Amman, Jordan.

He was city manager for Aspen, Colo., from 1964 to 1966 and assistant city manager of Rock Island, Ill., from 1961 to 1964.

Kerrigan holds a bachelor of arts from Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa, a bachelor of science and master of arts from the University of Iowa, and a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Colorado.

At Nebraska, he will be taking the place of Hubert Locke, who is going to the University of Washington to become associate dean of the College of Liberal Arts and professor of public affairs.

Guide to army engineers offered

A citizen's guide to working with the Army Corps of Engineers is now available, the Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group (OSPIRG) announced today.

"Oregonians need to become more involved in those Corps activities which impact the state's environmental quality and economic life," said Doug DuPriest, the author.

The 220-page guide, "Peaceful Corps Existence?" includes a description of the laws and regulations under which the Corps operates, suggested strategies for citizen involvement with Corps planning, an annotated bibliography and comments by the author, a third year law student at the University.

According to DuPriest, the Corps of Engineers has plans for at least six major dams on Oregon rivers and has recently acquired extensive authority over dredge and fill operations on Oregon rivers and streams. Other Corps duties include dredging navigation channels in rivers and harbors, and constructing levees, jetties and other small flood control structures.

"In using its vast powers, the Corps often seems bent on developing natural resources without considering human and environmental costs," DuPriest said.

"Oregonians must monitor Corps activities if they want to protect the values the Corps often ignores," DuPriest added. "We hope this guide will enable the public to communicate effectively with the Corps."

The entire guide is available for \$6, and individual chapters on Project Process, Environmental Impact Statements, Permits, Economics, and Legal Matters are available for \$3 each, from OSPIRG, 115 S.W. 4th Ave., Portland, Oregon 97204.
