

Aid offered for Ireland study

Two hundred scholarships for summer study to Ireland will be offered to American students in commemoration of the Bicentennial. The Council of International Educational Exchange (CIEE) will conduct the program open to full-time students attending American colleges and universities between the ages of 18 and 30.

Each scholarship provides for a four-week program in Ireland to focus on Irish and American links in the arts, politics and trade union movements. The scholarships do not provide for transportation to Ireland. However, the CIEE has arranged for round-trip airfares for the recipients at \$384 per person. The program will begin July 5 and run through August 2.

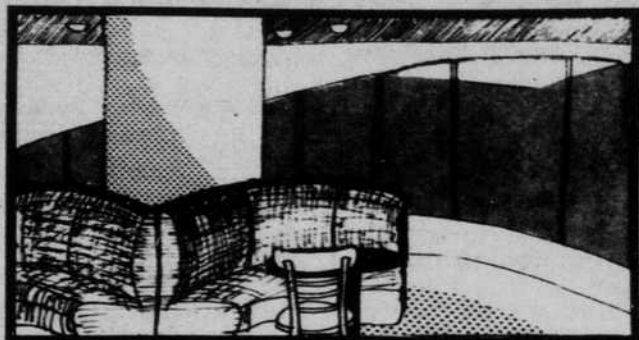

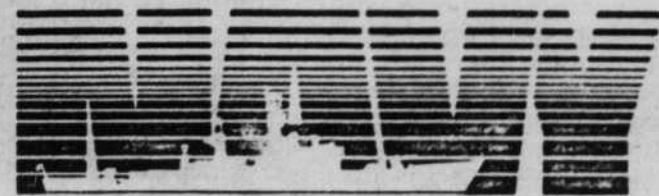
