Vet loan applications accepted

Veterans made eligible for the state veterans' farm and home loan program by passage of Measure No. 1 in the primary election May 25 can apply for the benefit immediately, according to the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Although the measure is not effective until June 25, loan applications will be taken now, according to H. Saalfeld, director of the department. Actual disbursement of loan money will have to wait until the effective date or later, he said.

Veterans made eligible by passage of the measure include:

- Post-Korean and Vietnam war veterans who came to Oregon after military discharge and lived here for two years prior to May 1, 1977. These veterans must have served 210 days or more after Jan. 1, 1960.

- World War II veterans who lived in Oregon for two years between date of discharge and Dec. 31, 1965. These vets must have served 90 days or more between Sept. 15, 1940 and July 25, 1947.

The exhibit is funded by the Memorial Union Program Council at Oregon State University, the OSU Bicentennial Committee and the OSU Foundation.

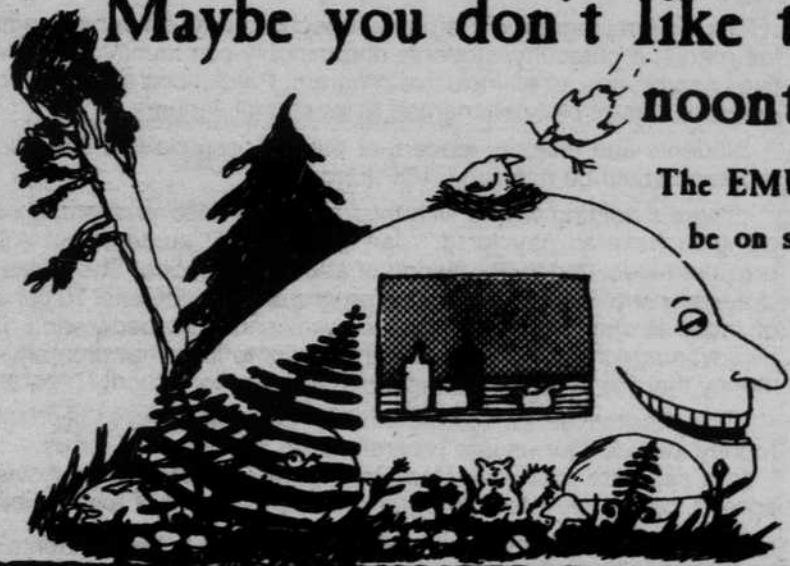
