EMU Check Cashing Information

The Erb Memorial Union Main Desk Store cashes checks as a service for students, faculty and staff of the University of Oregon. Students must present a **current certificate of registration and a plastic identification card with picture**; faculty/staff must present their plastic identification card with picture and current validation sticker.

There is a ten cent service charge per check. Make checks payable to the Erb Memorial Union and include Eugene address and phone number (or department and extension for faculty-staff) on the check. The limit on checks is \$5.00 until 4:30 p.m. weekdays and \$10.00 evenings and weekends.

When writing checks, double-check your bank balance. Make sure what you think will be a "good check" doesn't turn out to be a "bad check." If your check is returned, there is a service charge of \$3.00. This is in addition to any service charge charged by your bank. You will also lose the privilege of cashing checks at the Erb Memorial Union for the remainder of the year (July 1-June 30).

To abide by policies set forth by the banks: 1) We cannot accept counter checks, 2) There can be no alterations or changes made on checks, 3) We cannot accept personal second party checks and 4) If you do not have personalized checks additional I.D. must be presented.

I.D. FOR CASHING CHECKS PRIOR TO LAST DAY TO PAY FEES WITHOUT PENALTY.

New Students:

1. U. of O. statement of admission with student I.D. number
2. Valid I.D. with signature and description.

Returning Students:

1. Previous term's certificate of registration.
2. U. of O. Plastic I.D. card with picture.

Summer Session Only:

1. Validated certificate of registration.
2. U. of O. plastic I.D. card with picture or second piece of valid I.D.

Committee rejects proposal for instructor evaluation

A State Board of Higher Education committee rejected a proposal June 22 calling for instructional quality to rank above such activities as research, professional public service and institutional service in the evaluation of instructors. The proposal was cosponsored by the Oregon Student Lobby (OSL) and the ASUO.

But the Board Committee on Instruction, Research and Public Service Programs voted in favor of another OSL-ASUO initiated proposal introducing student participation in post-tenured review of faculty members.

A compromise motion, however, diluted the remainder of the second proposal, which was designed to clarify the role of students in decisions concerning the re-appointment, promotion, tenure and post-tenure review of instructors.

Although State Board guidelines previously dictated student involvement in all but post-tenured review, they do not define that involvement specifically. Currently, the guidelines simply require that "appropriate student input" be included in such decisions. "But at some institutions, and at some departments here, 'appropriate student input' consists of no student input," explains Mark Cogan, ASUO vice-president for state affairs. "That's what we want to change."

The OSL-ASUO proposal said student input into the decisions regarding faculty members "shall include, at a minimum" letters from students, student evaluations of instructors and appointment of students to personnel committees.

The board staff opposed spelling out student involvement in that manner, on the grounds that determining the exact nature of student input is best left to the individual institutions. "That approach is generally consistent with the board's way of working with the institutions," according to staff recommendations to the committee.

Committee members Betty Feves of Pendleton and Jane Carpenter of Medford agreed with the staff's recommendation, but Marc Maden of Portland and Ed Harms of Springfield said they generally supported the student proposal.

Harms proposed the compromise motion after a 2-2 vote, because in cases of a tie the committee sends no recommendation to the full board. He suggested rewording the proposal, stating student involvement "may include, but not be limited to," letters, evaluations and appointment of students to personnel committees.

Although the compromise motion passed unanimously, Harms said he didn't really support it, and doubted whether it would have any real effect because of the loose wording.

Both Cogan and the OSL consultant, former ASUO Vice Pres. Kirby Garrett, were disappointed with the compromise.

"We're fairly progressive concerning student participation in faculty evaluations here at the University," explained Cogan, "especially in the Schools of Education, Music and Architecture and in the Economics Department." But for some of the other institutions, "where they're not so progressive," a revision in State Board policy is really needed, in his opinion. "We hope to do better with

this at the next board meeting, though," he added.

At a meeting of another board committee the previous day (June 21), the OSL and ASUO representatives succeeded in obtaining a postponement of approval-rejection action concerning incidental fee guidelines for the seven state institutions until July 20. According to Garrett, the Committee on Finance and Administration merely "acknowledged" the guidelines were currently in operation; "it did not approve them."

The student groups requested the postponement because they were not notified until one week before the meeting the incidental fee issue was on the agenda. They were unprepared to fully present their opinions concerning State Board incidental fee policy on such short notice.

Currently, the board policy authorizes student government representatives to meet with the president of their school to formulate guidelines for budgeting and allocating incidental fees. "But this policy," says Garrett, "does not recognize that students be involved in the actual campus decisions" regarding incidental fee allocation — "only that they be involved in establishing a formal process" for making those decisions. "Inclusion in that process doesn't necessarily follow."

"Here at the University," Garrett explains, "our Incidental Fee Committee is made up entirely of students. But at some of the other schools, there are instructors, administrators and even classified staff on the committees. At the upcoming board meeting we'll present our thoughts regarding a more responsible board statement on incidental fees as far as students are concerned."
