LTD installs new Eugene bus stops

In bus terminology, stop means go. That is, the bus "stop" where you get on the bus. Lane Transit District drivers are now picking up passengers at posted signs installed in 150 new locations in Eugene.

The new signs have been located along segments of LTD routes on 11th, 13th, West 8th avenues, and Harris Street in Eugene.

"Most passengers prefer the

posted stops," says LTD General Manager Fred Dyer, "as they reduce confusion about where to wait for the bus.

Lane Transit drivers have been supplied with a brief written explanation of the new stops for passengers who are not yet aware of the new signs in their neighborhoods. Currently, designated stops exist in most of central Eugene and on portions of routes in Springfield and South Eugene.

Dyer views the installation of stops as an important factor in the continued improvement of bus service in Lane County. "As our riders begin to use the stops, drivers will be required to stop fewer times along the route. Thus, we will be better able to make transfer connections and allow our riders to get to their destination on time." The stops also contribute to the safety of passengers boarding or exiting a bus.

The signs are part of the district's five-year transit development program, paid for through a match of 20 per cent local funds to 80 per cent federal funds. Signs, shelters and benches are installed in phases and, according to Dyer, no additional signs will be installed for another year.

Parks dept offers court reservation

Tennis enthusiasts have been having an increasingly difficult time finding tennis courts on which to play. Lines are long and tempers are often short as players try to use the 23 Eugene courts.

Eugene Parks and Recreation Department began a tennis court reservation system June 26 to try to reduce the problems of crowded court and long waiting lines.

Following the example of many other communities, tennis courts can be reserved for one and a half hour blocks of time for \$2 per court evenings and weekends and \$1 weekdays 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Reservations can be made for times between 8:30 a.m.-1 p.m. and between 5:30 p.m. and 10 p.m. Reservations can be made Monday through Friday beginning at noon each Monday. Weekend reservations must be made and paid for by closing time Friday.

Reservations can be made in person or over the phone. All reservations made over the phone must be paid within 24 hours before the reserved time or they will be cancelled.

One court at each location will be open for free use.
