Library hours alter for final weeks of term

University library hours will change for the final three weeks of summer session.

Beginning Saturday and continuing through Sept. 3, the general library will be open Monday to Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and will be closed Sundays. The science library will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and will be closed Saturdays and Sundays.

After Sept. 4, both library units will operate from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and be closed Saturdays and Sundays until the start of fall term.

Swimming hole safety checked

Tests conducted by the Lane County Environmental Health Division staff indicate the following areas are safe for swimming: The coastal lakes, Fern Ridge, Cottage Grove and Dorena reservoirs, and Fall Creek.

The Mohawk River above Marcola is safe, but it is not below Marcola. The McKenzie River is safe, except just below Camp Creek, where it is marginal.

The Willamette River is safe except between Island Park and the confluence of the coast and mid-forks of the Willamette. Downstream, from Island Park to the McKenzie, is listed as marginal.

The middle fork of the Willamette is safe except where it is joined by the Lower Coast Fork and Salmon, Lost and Hills creeks.

The Siuslaw River is safe, from its source, to about three miles above Mapleton. From there, to the mouth of the Siuslaw, is considered marginal.

Other marginal areas are Triangle Lake and the lagoon at Alton Baker Park which are drastically affected by rain-water runoff.

Listed as unsafe are the Mill-races in Eugene and Springfield, Amazon Creek and the "Q" Street Floodway.

Division pursues frauds

The State Public Welfare Division is about to launch an intensive program to identify and prosecute cases of food stamp fraud, according to welfare administrator, J.N. "Nick" Peet.

"Causes of alleged food stamp fraud will be referred to our investigation unit by our workers in the field and from the public - at large, and an average of 100 investigations per month will be conducted during the next year," Peet said.

"The primary purpose of our heightened effort in this area is to weed out those who are abusing the food stamp system and to discourage others from committing fraud in the future.

"Past experience reveals that less than one per cent of all Oregon food stamp households are committing fraud; our intent is

to zero in on those few so that the taxpayer has confidence that these benefits are only going to those who are legitimately eligible," Peet continued.

The Emergency Board of the Oregon State Legislature recently allocated funds for additional staff to investigate food stamp fraud on a state-wide basis. Over \$50,000 is projected to be saved in the next 12 months.

The purpose of the National Food Stamp Program is to enable low-income households to buy more food of greater variety to improve their diets. To purchase food stamps, participants pay a sum of money based on their family size and net monthly income. Presently, 63,313 Oregon households are receiving food stamp benefits.
