Ballet to aid music students

Carlos Carvajal's Dance Spectrum, a modern ballet company based in San Francisco, will perform Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the Performing Arts Theater at Lane Community College. Proceeds from the performance will go for scholarships for music students attending LCC. Tickets are \$1.50 for students with identification and \$3 for townspeople. All tickets are general admission and are for sale at the LCC Performing Arts box office, or by calling the box office at 747-4559, and at the door. The box office open from noon to 5 p.m. weekdays.

The performance is part of Dance Spectrum's first Northwest tour, which also includes programs in Aberdeen, Wash., and Ashland. Founded in 1970 by Carlos Carvajal, Dance Spectrum's repertoire combines contemporary dance with ballet traditions. The LCC performance will feature a variety of styles and moods. The background for the dances includes the spoken word as well as musical selections from Debussy, Ravel, Takemitsu, Ponce and an electronic score of Morton Subotnick.

Institute opens fall marine studies

The first complete fall term of classes in marine biology began this week at the University's Institute of Marine Biology in Charleston. In recent years, the institute, near Coos Bay, has offered classes only in the summer and spring. About 25 students have enrolled this fall in classes including Marine Algae, Evolution and Ecology, Biology of Estuarine Systems, Invertebrate Zoology and a seminar in Marine Biology. Additional personalized classes have also been arranged by some students. Classes at the institute are open to all students in the Oregon State System of Higher Education. Costs and academic credits are the same as those paid by students attending the University in Eugene. Questions about the classes can be directed to Paul Rudy, director of the institute, P.O. McCall Keynotes press meet

Former Oregon Gov. Tom McCall will deliver the keynote address at the 50th High School Press Conference on the campus Friday, Oct. 8. McCall will speak at 11 a.m. at an all-conference session in the EMU. More than 500 high school and junior high journalists from throughout the state are expected to attend the two-day meeting. In conjunction with the conference, delegates will commemorate 200 years of scholastic journalism and will receive copies of the first student newspaper, published in 1777 in Philadelphia. Fifty-two workshops covering all phases of newspaper and

yearbook journalism are on the program. The workshops will be led by professional journalists, university professors and high school advisors.

Professional meetings for journalism teachers are also on the docket. John Stoecker, positive thinking advocate, will conduct a session in positive image-building for journalism advisors and Warren Morgan, photographer for the Eugene Register-Guard, will present a slide show on photography and graphics.

Barre Toelken, English professor, will present a program of guitar music and folklore at the 6:30 p.m. annual conference banquet in the EMU dining room. Toelken is widely known for his knowledge of folklore, the ballad and for his interest in Native Americans.

An on-the-spot writing contest will be conducted Friday afternoon. Sponsored by Oregon Journalism Educators, the contest is limited to one student per school, per category. Writers will compete in news, editorials, features, sports, yearbook copy and layout, and editorial cartooning divisions. Judges for the contest will be Eugene professional journalists. Awards will be presented at an all-conference gathering 11:15 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 9.

The conference is sponsored by the journalism school. Galen Rarick, dean, will serve as master of ceremonies. Mary Hartman, executive secretary of Oregon Scholastic Press, is conference chair.

All sessions are open to the public. Tickets to the Friday evening banquet, at \$4.60 per person, are available before Oct. 5 at the journalism school office in Allen Hall.
