

# Rule moves Brown appearance

Gov. Jerry Brown's appearance on behalf of John Stewart, Democratic candidate for the Oregon House, scheduled for next Friday at Murphy and Me's tavern ran into a few problems with the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC).

The OLCC has a regulation restricting campaign appearances at establishments serving alcohol. Consequently, the Stewart committee decided to

change the location of the benefit appearance to 1780 Alder St.
