

Candidate outlines plans

Delay supports planned growth

Charging his opponent with being "disdainful" of Eugene's neighborhood groups, Jack Delay, candidate for the city

council Third Ward, outlined his own plans for Eugene's future at a meeting of the Democratic Forum Thursday.

Delay supported a program of planned, moderate growth for Eugene, and stressed the need to include neighborhood groups in the planning process.

Delay claimed Tom Moreland, his opponent, offended a Bethel neighborhood group by calling them "un-American" when they opposed a mobile home park being built in their area.

Moreland is an architect in the local firm of Unruh, Moreland and growth" policy.

Referring to Moreland's opposition to a policy of limited growth, Delay insisted he would "never sell out the average citizen's interests for the special interests of a few."

Delay also stressed the need to encourage alternatives to automobile travel in Eugene through continued construction of bikeways and improvement of the bus system. The candidate feels Eugene's long-range goal of having 30 per cent of all trips provided by alternative means of transportation is realistic.

"Some people think it's impossible and a harebrained idea," Delay said, "but I think it can be done with responsible leadership."

Delay also supported Ballot Measure No. 9, claiming it is "foolhardy" to proceed with

nuclear power plant construction until safety problems are worked out.

He favors a program of energy conservation, linked with the implementation of solar energy, as a solution to the area's energy problems.

Delay and Moreland are competing in the city's third ward, which includes much of downtown Eugene and the west University neighborhood. It extends roughly from 7th Avenue to 22nd Avenue, and from Kincaid Street to Jefferson Street.

Delay, a six-year resident of Eugene, has been very active in Democratic politics in Oregon. A member of both the state and county Democratic committees, he also served as a member of the Democratic National Platform Committee last spring.

A computer systems analyst, Delay is director of computing at the Oregon Research Institute.
