

## Report hearings on child care set for morning

The Oregon State Board of Higher Education task force on day care will meet Saturday morning on campus to hear committee reports on eligibility guidelines and information gathering for state-wide questionnaires.

Members of the eligibility committee have looked into areas of eligibility guidelines, whether day care subsidies should go to part-time students or just to full-time students and other related issues.

The statistics committee has developed a questionnaire to send to all state system institutions to "elicit information that will document the need for increased additional state subsidies," according to Bob Nagler, Associated Students of the University of Oregon (ASUO) task force member and administrative assistant.

The task force was originally organized by the board to look into the need for child care for post-secondary students.

Nagler feels it is a critical issue and says "some low income students get day care, but there are other low income students who aren't getting it because of their status in school."

Members of the task force include student representatives from the University of Oregon, Oregon State University, Oregon College of Education, the Oregon Student Lobby (OSL) and Oregon Scholarship Commission.

Representatives from the Educational Coordinating Commission, State Executive Department, and Portland State University will also attend Saturday's meeting scheduled for 10:30 a.m. in Room 101, Johnson Hall.

## EPA says bad air speeds grey hair

Americans are older than they think.

New U.S. Environmental Protection Agency tests with animals show that they grow older faster when breathing polluted air.

The test results released by the Environmental Research Lab in Research Triangle Park, N.C., revealed that when polluted air was blown on animals it prematurely aged the elastic recoil properties of their lungs.

The lungs are responsible for supplying the body with essential oxygen. Without a good supply of oxygen, the heart, the lungs, and the muscles deteriorate.

One of the causes of senility, the curse of the old, is the lack of oxygen to the brain.

In addition, tests with animals have shown that high oxidant air pollution levels of .2 parts per million for five hours

can produce lung cancer.

After the lungs, oxidants which make up a large percentage of ozone can attack the chromosomal line-up of an animal after exposure of .20 ppm for five hours.

Other research data shows that animals suffer a decrease in body defenses against infection after exposure of .10 ppm for 2 1/2 hours.

Behavioral changes were noted in animals after .05 ppm for five hours.

Finally, animals showed decreased fertility and increased mortality after being exposed to .05 to .1 ppm for two years.

Air pollution is already known to make worse the pre-existing illnesses of asthma, heart disease, chronic bronchitis and emphysema.

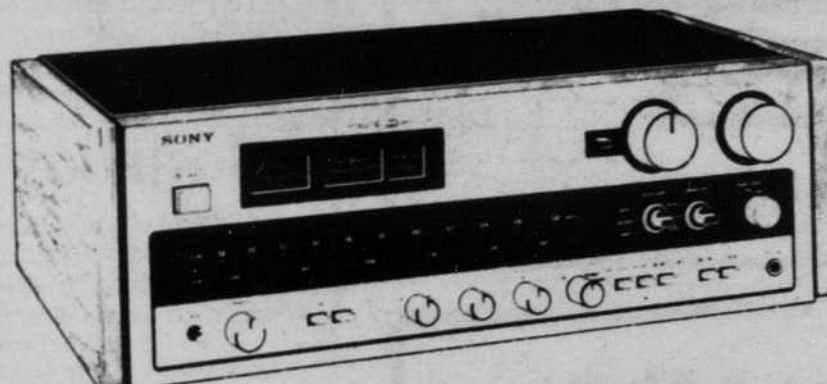
