

League bowlers to strike cancer

Qualifying rounds for Oregon's annual benefit bowling tournament for the American Cancer Society will be held Oct. 24 through Nov. 7 in bowling centers throughout the state. League bowlers can qualify by

paying 50 cents and topping their average in their third game. The top man and woman bowler will win a 1977 Volkswagen. A second prize is \$500, followed by 75 other prizes donated by businessmen. In the past 15 years this event has raised over \$300,000 for the cancer control program in Oregon. The benefit is sponsored by the Oregon State Bowling Proprietors' Association.

Police to brief seniors on crime

Topics for the individual sessions will be "Orientation to Crime Prevention" (Oct. 13), "Street Crime" (Oct. 20), "Burglary" (Oct. 27), "Fraud-Bunco" (Nov. 3), and "Police Community Relations" (Nov. 10). Jim Bottom, editor of The Phoenix, says the sessions are open to all age groups.

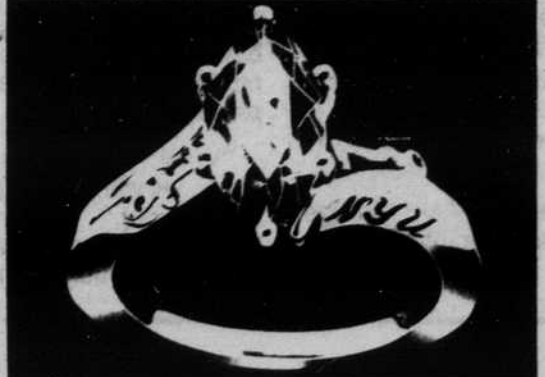
