

Guest teacher to demonstrate African 'music'

An Indiana music educator will demonstrate a variety of African musical instruments today during a guest talk at the University's music school.

Mary Oyer, head of the music department at Goshen (Ind.) College will speak at 2:30 p.m. in Beall Concert Hall.

A Fulbright Scholar, Oyer spent four years studying in East Africa, Ghana, Liberia, Nigeria and Gambia.

In addition to performing, she will describe how a person trained in Western or European music adapts to learning the music of another culture.

Admission to the talk is free.

In addition to investigating alleged acts of discrimination in housing, employment and public accommodations, the human rights staff is responsible for helping businesses to implement fair employment practices and for general community education in the area of human rights.

Contemporary mood set for Beall concert

The Performers' Committee for 20th Century Music will perform tonight at 8 in the music school's Beall Concert Hall. The concert will include vocal, piano and piano-ensemble music. Admission is \$2.

The New York-based ensemble, devoted to performing the music of this century, is well-known for its concert series in that city. In this program, soprano

Judith Nicosia will sing songs by Elliot Carter and Arnold Schoenberg, and John Cage's "Aria," which is partly composed by the performer. Pianists Cheryl Seltzer and Joel Sachs will play solo piano music by Henry Cowell, Ruth Crawford Seeger and Stefan Wolpe. They will also play a work for piano and tape by the Argentinian composer Mario Davidovsky and a composition for prepared piano by Cage.

The major work will be "Three Pieces for Quarter-Tone Pianos" by Charles Ives, in which one piano is tuned a quarter-tone below the other. When the two instruments perform together, they can produce a scale of 24 notes to the octave.

In addition to the concert the Performers' Committee will give a workshop from 10 a.m. to noon in Beall Hall. Although the workshop is intended for composition majors, the public is invited to attend. The public is also invited to a preview performance at 2:30 p.m. today in Beall Hall.
