The University's Psychology Clinic is seeking 10 patients for a special "self-administered" depression treatment program. Treatment will focus on how a

person's mood relates to their activities.

Persons interested in treatment must first take part in an assessment procedure, including interviews and questionnaires.

Treatment includes reading assignments, meetings with a therapist once every two weeks and regular telephone contacts. There is no charge for treatment. However, patients are required to pay a deposit with refund contingent upon cooperation in keeping appointments, records and carrying out prescribed strategies.

Grants increase

The University has received more than \$5.7 million in grants and contracts for instruction, research and extension purposes since July 1, 1976—a \$1.1 million increase over the same period last year.

Scandinavia course open

Scandinavian Seminar is now accepting applications for its study abroad program in Denmark, Finland, Norway or Sweden for the academic year 1977-78.

During the 3-week language course, students will live and study at the "People's College" (a residential school for continuing

adult education) or some other specialized institution. A family stay will follow whenever possible, giving students opportunities to practice the language on a daily basis.

The focus of the seminar is an independent study project in the student's own field of interest. All students participate in the introductory, midyear and final sessions, where their studies and experiences are reviewed and discussed.

The fee is \$3,800 and covers tuition, room, board, one-way transportation from New York and all course-connected travels in Scandinavia. A limited number of scholarship loans are available, and many universities are giving full or partial credit for the seminar.
