Rabbi speaks on death

Human service professionals and students are invited to attend a half-day seminar on death education in Eugene Wednesday.

The seminar is entitled "Death: The Last Enemy" and is co-sponsored by the Oregon Funeral Directors Association, the

Oregon State Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers, the University of Oregon Health Sciences Center and the University's gerontology center.

Featuring Rabbi Earl Grollman of Boston, Mass., the seminar will be held from 1 to 5 p.m. at the Rodeway Inn motel and restaurant, Interstate 5 and Beltline Road.

No registration fee is required, however, advance registration with the Oregon Funeral Directors Association, Suite 205, Mohawk Building, Portland, is requested.

The program is aimed at providing death education information to physicians; registered nurses; clergy; medical, nursing, and seminary students; hospital administrators; educators; mental health professionals; and funeral service licensees.

The seminar leader is director of the Beth El Temple Center in Boston and a consultant to the Governor's Council on Action for Mental Health in Massachusetts.

He serves on the Harvard University professional advisory board and is the author of three books on death education.

County hearing slated


