

Ivie adds human touch to ASUO

Editor's Note: This is the second article in a five-part series examining the four ASUO vice-presidential sectors and ASUO Pres. Jan Oliver's administration. Wednesday, the Emerald will look at Vice-Pres. Gary Kim who is in charge of state and local affairs.

Increased support of ASUO programs and more interaction with the community were major proposals when Jan Oliver successfully campaigned for ASUO president last spring. The task of implementing the policy falls on those she appointed to deal with

the topics, Tamanika Ivie and Michael Connelly.

"The coordination of resources can double the strength of ASUO programs," said Ivie, vice-president for ASUO programs and community affairs. "Our goal is to let students and programs know one another's resources, and to eliminate walls between the community and programs," added Connelly, administrative assistant.

The budget for the ASUO Programs and Affairs Office is only six per cent that allotted the ASUO Executive, one-fifth the amount used for ASUO lobbying in Salem. Three people work in the office with Ivie and Connelly to keep in

contact with more than 50 programs the ASUO helps sponsor.

They predict that three-quarters of the students will have some direct contact with an ASUO program this year. SEARCH, the largest ASUO program, is serving nearly 1,000 students this fall.

Ivie said she and Connelly plan to write a brochure with a detailed description of each program so that students will "know exactly what is available to them."

ASUO programs aren't clubs any longer; they are more like agencies that offer services.

Action Now, for example, loans out all kinds of garden, carpentry and mechanics tools to students wanting to build things, or make

repairs in their homes or on their cars and bikes. This is a free service to all students. Action Now is located at 1557 Agate St., next to the Food-op.

The ASUO sponsors a drug information hotline, 686-5411, for students to ask questions about any drugs they may be using. Drug samples will be tested for purity and safety free of charge with no questions or names asked.

"We want to deal with programs in human ways," said Ivie.

She and Connelly have planned a retreat for program directors at a Girl Scout camp at Cleawox Lake near Florence Oct. 22 to 24.
