Student here first woman granted education award

Gail Fullington, education doctoral student, has become the first woman ever to receive the American Association of School Administrators (AASA) Sherwood Shankland award.

The \$1,500 Shankland scholarship is one of four scholarships presented each year in honor of the past executive secretaries of AASA. Through national competition, the scholarships are provided for doctoral students attending colleges of education offering instructional preparation for superintendency certification.

In addition to being the first woman recipient of the Shankland scholarship, Fullington is also the first University student to win the award.

Salem internships open
