

Oregon motorists can start using studded snow tires now, the Oregon Transportation Commission decided Tuesday.

The commission, which has the authority to change the period studded tires may be used, decided to move the starting date from Nov. 1 to Tuesday because of the amount of snow in the mountain passes.

The use of studded tires becomes illegal again after April 30.
