

Campus flu vaccine allotment limited

The swine flu vaccine (monovalent) has arrived in Eugene and the campus immunization clinic should be in full swing one week from Monday.

Ruth Atland, Student Health Center nurse states, "because our first allotment of swine flu vaccine is limited to 5,000 shots, we are starting the clinic for registered students only on a first come, first served basis."

The original plan to distribute the shots was the same method used in class registration, but because of the small allotment, health officials decided that it would only be fair to do it according to the first come first serve basis.

The shots will be available to students daily from Mon. Nov. 8, through Friday, Nov. 12. Times are from 8:30 a.m., to 11:30 p.m., and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.. The clinic will be stationed in the basement of the Student Health Center (Czech Street entrance).

According to Atland, the student health center has approximately 300 injections of last year's flu vaccine, containing the Port Chalmers A strain and the Hong Kong B strain. "We are unable to purchase any more flu vaccine this year," she says, "all the flu vaccine production has been directed toward the government immunization program."

The 300 injections will be given to registered students on a first come first serve basis on Tues. Nov. 2 from 8 a.m., to 11 a.m., and on Wed. Nov. 3 from 8 a.m. to

11:30 a.m., at the Student Health Center.

The vaccine does not contain the A Victoria strain which is in the bivalent vaccine that is offered to the elderly and chronically ill through the government program. (Now being offered through Lane County locations.)

If a student does receive last year's vaccine then they will have to wait a minimum of 14 days before receiving the swine flu vaccination.

Other precautions should be taken by students wanting the swine flu inoculation.

If students are allergic to eggs, feathers or chicken they are urged not to get a shot, because the virus used in making the vaccine

is grown in eggs. Pregnant students are also advised not to receive the swine flu inoculation.

Written consent forms will be handed out at the health center during the clinic. Students receiving the shots must sign these.

Previously the clinic was to include faculty and staff but Atland says "as we are allotted more vaccine, we will make arrangements for giving the immunizations to faculty and staff." She also said that dependents of registered students over the age of 18 will be included in this latter group.

Gay Alliance plans activities

Programs, activities and entertainment to illustrate the changing status of the homosexual are scheduled for Gay Pride Week, which starts Monday. The Gay People's Alliance (GPA) is scheduling the week-long event.

Gay Pride Week is a public awareness effort, funded by the Incidental Fee Committee (IFC), to increase the University and community consciousness of the gay liberation movement.

"Due to a larger monetary allotment, we've been able to get very high quality speakers and entertainers this year," says Dan McCauley, of GPA. "Several of the films we've scheduled are associated with great European directors," he added.

Through Gay Pride Week, the GPA hopes to erase any misconceptions about homosexuality, McCauley said.

Scheduled for Monday is a panel discussion titled "Coming Out" from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. in the EMU Forum. An 8 p.m. concert, also in the Forum, will feature Horizon and Susan Arrow. A \$1 admission will be charged.

The next events are a poetry workshop led by gay poet Robert Duncan, from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. in the Forum. Duncan, a three-time winner of the Poetry Magazine Award and recipient of the National Endowment for the Arts, will present readings in the EMU Ballroom at 8 p.m.

Thursday, the film "Teorama," by Piero Pasolini will be shown at 7 and 9 p.m. in 150 Geology. Admission is \$1.

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A panel discussion on the "Marxist Theory of Gay Oppression and of Liberated Sexuality" will take place from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. Friday in the Forum. GPA will sponsor a dance from 7 to 11 p.m. in the ballroom. Music will be by Felicidades, with a \$1 charge.

A discussion on gay rights and tactics will be conducted by Mother Kali's Bookstore and persons from the University law school Saturday. It will take place at 2 p.m. in the Grower's Market, 454 Willamette St. A showing of the film, "The Bitter Tears of Petra

Von Kant," by Rainer Marie Fassbinder is scheduled for 7 and 9 p.m. at 180 PLC. A \$1 admission will be charged.

Gay Pride Week concludes Sunday, Nov. 7, with readings by local gay poets from 7 to 9 p.m. in the EMU Forum.

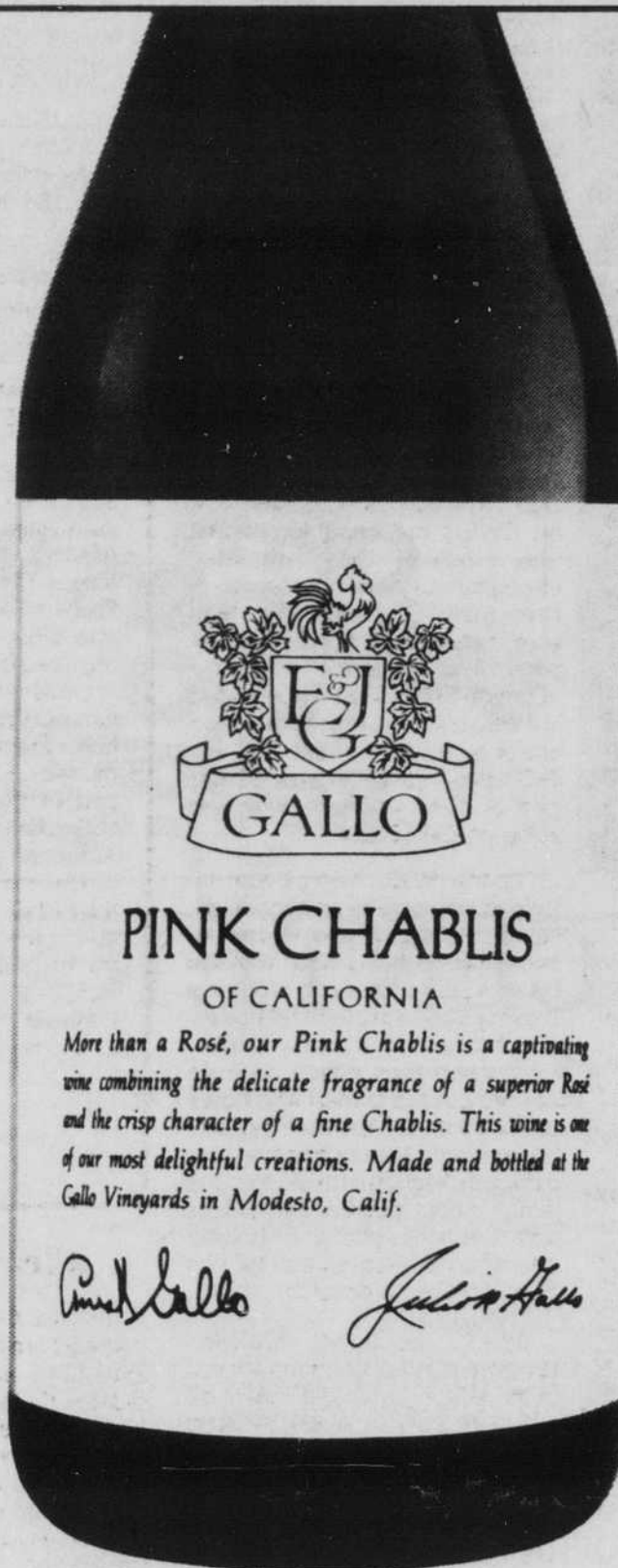
