CRISIS PREVENTION

Ward 3 has a high incidence of larceny and rape. Patrol cars insulate police officers from the community and usually respond to people's needs after the fact. Bicycle and foot patrols would humanize the police-neighborhood contact and help prevent crime. Freedom from fear must be a basic priority of city government. Additional investment should be made in crime prevention programs.

NUCLEAR SAFEGUARD INITIATIVE

Ballot Measure #9 is a citizen's initiative. The slick, expensive and misleading industry campaign against it is appalling. Common sense demands that the problems of safety, waste management, and accident liability be solved before any nuclear expansion is allowed.

NEIGHBORHOOD ORGANIZATIONS

Population growth has caused units of government to become so large and complex that it is increasingly difficult for citizens to deal with them. This is why I support strong neighborhood organizations. They are a vehicle for local participation in local government, a citizens lobby. When people get together and work on problems in their neighborhoods that they know and understand then they gain power in the public policy-making process. If more people offer a little time with their neighbors, grass roots ideas could once again replace bureaucratic guesses.

TRANSPORTATION

Our delicate airshed demands that we pursue less polluting alternatives for transportation. We must work to increase the use of appropriate alternatives such as bicycles and buses. The only way this can be done is to make alternatives relatively more attractive than automobiles. For buses this means more sheltered bus stops, low rates for seniors and commuters, and a continued upgrading of services. More investment should be made in safe and convenient bikeways.

URBAN GROWTH

All of our planning for transportation, housing, and city services must be based upon the ability to control our growth if it is to be effective. The present compact growth policy has helped avoid the blight of urban sprawl, the loss of productive farmlands, and the insupportable costs of expanding urban services. We must now develop a planned growth policy. This can be done like the city of Petaluma has by approving a fixed number of residential subdivisions from among all those proposed. All proposals are evaluated by a citizen's committee using a scoring system based on community goals. The beauty of this evaluation system is that design competition has developed among the builders with each trying to outdo the next in providing plans sensitive to community needs.

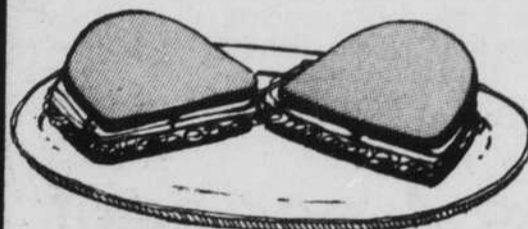
