Congressman Jim Weaver, Democratic candidate for Congress from the Fourth District, was one of a covey of candidates who supported Ballot Measure 9 at a rally Monday. The measure, known as the Nuclear Safeguards Act, is being voted on statewide today. Weaver was joined in the EMU Ballroom by Jerry Rust, Camilla Pratt, Nancie Fadeley, Neil Murray, John Stewart and Jack Delay. Although he was not there in person, Gov. Jimmy Carter relayed a message of support for the measure.

RSB to support demonstrations

As voters across the country go to the polls today and cast their ballots—some out of a sense of obligation or despair—groups around the nation will take the day to display alternative political views.

Locally, the University chapter of the Revolutionary Student Brigade will distribute armbands bearing the words "Politicians Fight for Money Interests, We Must Fight for Our Own!" to the University community.

Brigade member John Lanier explains the armbands may be worn as a symbolic protest by those voting as well as those people who are completely alienated from the electoral process.

"The armband does not make the statement 'I'm not voting,'" Lanier says. "People who are concerned with specific ballot

measures or a certain candidate may wear the armband as a way of saying they are angry with politicians and the lies they continually tell us. Anybody can wear these armbands as a way of saying they are tired of having to pick the lesser of two evils in a race."

The Brigade plans an election day rally for 12:30 p.m. on the EMU Terrace. A skit and a short speech are scheduled.

"We want to make people aware of what the real purpose of the election is," Lanier says. "It is important for people to know the motives of the people who run this country and what the elections mean to them. It's also necessary for people to be aware of the stand others around the country are taking in response to the elections."

A large election day march and rally will take place in Portland beginning at 5 p.m. The demonstration is sponsored by the Unemployed Workers Organizing Com-

mittee and the Revolutionary Communist Party. A march route running from Sixth and Morrison streets in downtown Portland, proceeding past Carter and Ford campaign headquarters, and terminating at a rally point in front of the Benson Hotel has been arranged.

The Portland demonstration is broadly based, according to organizers, with support coming from workers, veterans and students in the Portland area. The Portland demonstration is one of 20 scheduled to take place throughout the nation. A parallel march and rally is planned for Seattle and other major American cities, say organizers.

Cars will leave for the Portland march at 2:30 p.m. from the EMU. Round-trip transportation to and from the demonstration is available through the Revolutionary Student Brigade. Brigade members can be contacted on the EMU terrace.
