The film's director, writer and two of its featured actors, Zero Mostel and Herschel Bernardi, were all actually blacklisted during the McCarthy period.

Allen plays a mild-mannered

restaurant cashier who begins fronting scripts for his buddies, becomes a celebrity, and ends up subpoenaed by the House Un-American Activities Committee.
