Sponsored as part of the University's centennial year observance, the meeting will offer a full range of topics in fluid dynamics, including hydromechanics, ionized flow, and atmospheric and oceanographic fluid phenomena.

The Otto Laporte Memorial Lecture, open free of charge to the public, will be given in the EMU Ballroom Nov. 22 at 8 p.m. George Carrier, a fluid dynamicist from Harvard University, will speak on "Some Phenomena I Wish I Understood."

Trio of artisans show displays at gallery here

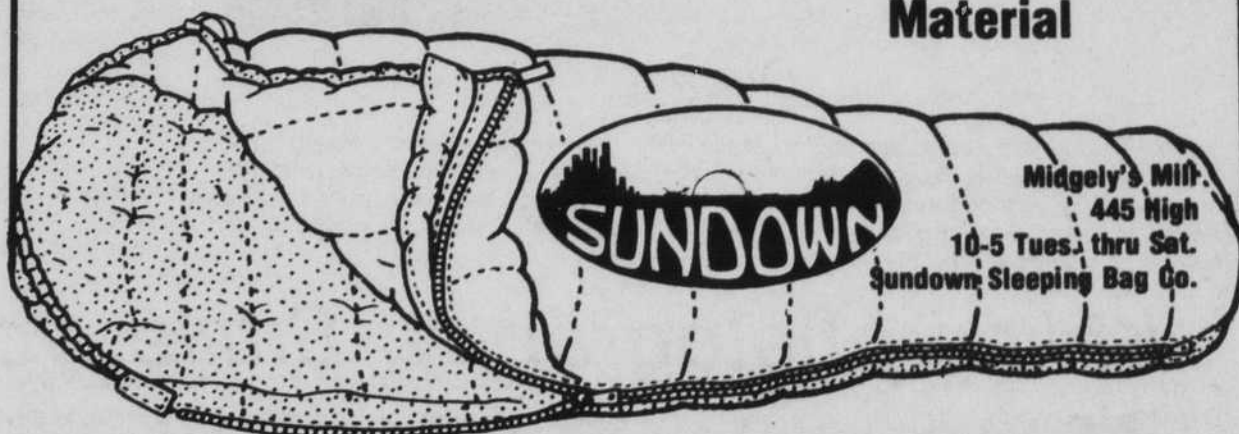
Three different media will be on display in three one-man shows in the University Art Museum's Main Gallery.
