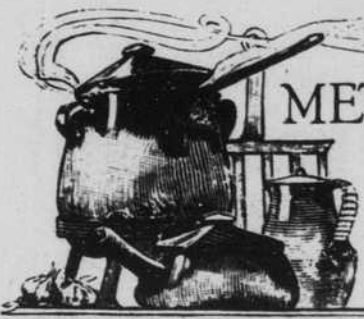

County initiates council, opens health posts

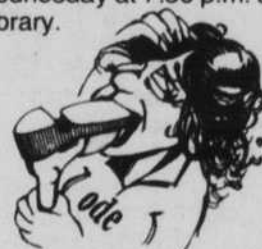
