

HEW positions open

The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare (HEW) is now taking applications for 20 available positions in the HEW Fellows Program. The program, designed to identify outstanding talent and develop leadership in persons employed primarily outside government, provides individuals the opportunity to serve for 12 months as assistants to key officials in HEW.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens, have a record of demonstrated interest in community service and the nation's social problems and have experience in education and specialized managerial or community experience. Current salary range will be \$16,255 to \$31,309 based on academic background, experience and prior earnings.

Library sets computer class

Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) data base workshops will be held Tuesday and Wednesday in the general library.

The ERIC data base — the most widely used computer-searchable data base in the social sciences — specializes in education but is useful to persons in disciplines as diverse as physical education, linguistics and environmental studies. The workshops will introduce the ERIC system and materials and will cover the principles of manual and computer searching.

The workshops, jointly sponsored by the ERIC Clearinghouse on Educational Management and the education-psychology division of the library, will be held Tuesday from 7 to 9 p.m. in Studio C of the library audiovisual center and on Wednesday from 3 to 5 p.m. in Studio A. The workshops are free but are limited to 50 persons and advance registration is required.

Group hosts fall workshop

The Oregon Community Education Association (OCEA), based at the University, will hold its fall in-service workshop Friday and Saturday at Kah-Nee-Tah resort, near Madras. Anyone interested in community education and community schools is invited to attend the workshop, or the association's annual convention, scheduled for early March.

There are 31 Oregon school districts involved, to some degree, in community school programs. A

community school is one which is open to the community for use and involves the community in the education of the children which attend it.

Membership in OCEA is open to all interested persons. Yearly dues are \$5. The organization has grown into the largest community education association in the nation since it was formed three years ago, according to Guy Faust, OCEA administrative assistant.

The Kah-Nee-Tah workshop will consist of five in-depth workshops. Topics will be Introduction to Community Education, Communications, Supervisory Skills, Conducting Effective Meetings and Needs/Resource Assessment.

The workshop costs \$42 for non-OCEA members, including meals and lodging. A \$9 fee can be paid to cover registration only. Persons wishing more information should contact Faust at 686-3996.

Deadlines approach for grants

The University Office of Federal Relations announced December application deadlines for several specialized fellowship and grant programs sponsored by the Social Science Research Council (SSRC) and National Science Foundation (NSF).

The Postdoctoral Grants for Research on Foreign Areas program supports research in one country, comparative research between countries, and comparative research between areas including Africa, contemporary and Republican China, Japan, Korea, Latin America and Caribbean, Near and Middle East, South Asia, and Southeast Asia. Applicants must have doctorate in social sciences or humanities and have demonstrated research competence. The stipend varies with particular area and/or country, but includes travel, research and maintenance expenses. Dec. 3 has been set for the deadline for receipt of applications.

The Postdoctoral Research Training Fellowships program offers funds for additional research training study beyond that required in doctoral programs to prepare scholars for innovative research in the social sciences for periods of nine to twelve months. Dec. 15 is the last day applicants may submit forms. Persons with doctorates in the social sciences are eligible. Mature scholars are encouraged to apply. Awards will not exceed \$10,000 for a 12-month period.

The Student Originated Studies (SOS) program deadline is Dec. 1. The purpose of the program is to support student-initiated, operated, and managed projects concerning some local problem dealing with the biological, physical, or social environment and pose questions of a scientific or technical nature on which a student group can conduct research, generally for a ten to twelve week period (most often during the summer). Par-

ticipant support provides for up to \$90 per week.

Graduate Fellowships are awarded to students who have not entered graduate school as of December, 1976, who plan to undertake a graduate program leading to a master's or doctoral degree in the sciences. Applicants must be U.S. citizens and have received the baccalaureate degree prior to fall 1977; \$3,900 will be provided for twelve month period of study. Dec. 1 is the deadline for receipt of applications.

The National Research Council is managing the **National Needs Post-doctoral Fellowships** for NSF. A date of Dec. 6 has been set as the deadline for applications. This program provides for up to 100 fellowships for postdoctoral research and study on scientific problems related to national needs. To be eligible one must be a citizen or national of the U.S., have a doctorate in one of the sciences and have received the degree within the past 5 years. The award has been set at \$12,000 per annum.

Dec. 15 is the deadline for **Scientists and Engineers in Economic Development Program (SEED)**. This award provides U.S. scientists and engineers to share experiences with counter parts in developing countries through research and education projects. Candidates must have at least five years postdoctoral experience. The stipend provided is not more than \$1,500 per month for up to 12 months. SEED program forms are available from the Division of International Programs, NSF, Washington, D.C. 20550.
