More women in sciences, workshop goal

Women who have made careers for themselves in science will speak at a workshop for women college students interested in scientific study, to be held on the University Friday and Saturday.

Among the topics to be covered at the workshops, sponsored by the National Science Foundation (NSF), are "Science Careers for Women: Prospects and Problems," "Graduate School: Getting In and Staying In" and "Combining Careers and Personal Life: Alternate Pathways."

The objective of the meeting is to increase the numbers of junior and senior level college women who plan to enter graduate training in the sciences, according to Joan Acker, associate professor of sociology and director of the workshop.

The workshop is designed to offer women the opportunity to explore careers in science, gather information about graduate school and discuss the combining of occupational and personal lives.

Among the women to speak at the workshop will be Mary Clutter, head of the Developmental Biology Section of NSF and Marjorie Balazs, an analytical physical chemist in the physical science division of Balazs Analytical Labs, which she founded.

Panel moderators for the workshop include Joan Acker, Miriam Johnson and Jean Stockard, all sociologists at the University.

Approximately 150 women from 11 colleges and universities in the Willamette Valley will participate in the workshop. The NSF is providing housing and charter bus transportation from Portland, Corvallis and Salem for participants.

Musical auditions open

Auditions for parts in a "musical space trip" will be held at 7 tonight at the Very Little Theatre. The play, entitled "Pardon Me, Is This Planet Taken?" needs males and females with dancing and singing abilities.

Five major singing roles for men and five for women are open. Also numerous roles are available in the play's chorus for roles of tourists, crewmen, pirates and Linjafoonianians (space creatures).

Tryouts are open to the public and no rehearsal piece is required, but semi-private auditions will be held for persons who have prepared musical numbers.

Production jobs involving set construction, costumes, lights and props are also open. Persons interested in them should contact the Very Little Theatre.

"Pardon Me, Is This Planet Taken?" is scheduled to open in late January and run through Feb. 5.

Atlas opens for viewing

An exhibit demonstrating the work involved in preparing and publishing the Atlas of Oregon is on display at the second-floor special collections division of the General Library.

The Atlas, described as "the first comprehensive full-color atlas of the state," was the product of more than three years' effort by author William Loy, associate professor of geography, and many co-laborators.

The exhibit shows an Atlas page outlining the historical development of the state's railroads to demonstrate the steps required to produce one of the book's 224 pages. The process is illustrated by original source material including historic maps from the library collection, and the text, written by Donald Smith, assistant University librarian.

The free exhibit will be on display through Jan. 3. The special collections division is open weekdays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday.
