Also taking place Friday is an equipment swap at 5 p.m. in the Ballroom. The Outdoor Program asks that "swappers" bring equipment in by 4:30 p.m.

Weather permitting, day trips are planned for this weekend to help people learn basic ski touring skills. The Outdoor Program, 23 EMU, has sign-up sheets and information on pre-trip meetings.

In its theme of tracing the development and the progression of exploration in the Northwest the museum has on display notable ship models such as the oldest and newest icebreakers to ply Arctic ice: the Revenue Cutter Bear and the Coast Guard cutter Polar Star.

The museum is a federally recognized non-profit organization. Contributions are tax-deductible. Visiting hours are Wednesdays 1 to 4 p.m. and Saturdays and Sundays from 1 to 5 p.m. The museum is located at the Coast Guard Support Center on the Seattle waterfront at Pier 36.
