Foreign research funds available

The Organization of American States (OAS) has announced Dec. 31 as the deadline for the OAS Regular Training Program.

Two kinds of fellowships are available from OAS: advanced study at the graduate level and research. Fellowships are granted for periods of not less than three months or more than two years.

Fellowships are tenable in any of the member countries of OAS (Argentina, Barbados, Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Costa Rica, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Grenada, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Jamaica, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, the United States, Trinidad, Tobago, Uruguay, and Venezuela). Candidates must choose a country or countries other than where they maintain permanent residence.

Roman school offers fellowships

The American Academy in Rome has announced a Dec. 31 deadline for this year's competition for its Rome Prize Fellowships.

Applications are restricted to the following fields: architecture and landscape architecture, planning and design (environmental, urban, interior, industrial), sculpture, painting, musical composition, classical literature and history, post-classical humanistic studies, Italian studies, history of art and literature (creative writing). The academy will make as many awards as resources permit. There is no commitment that an award will be made in each field eligible.

The competition is open to U.S. citizens only. Applicants must be able to demonstrate evidence of outstanding promise and achievement. For particular fields additional requirements have been stipulated.

The award provides for monthly stipend, travel allowance, supplies allowance, and residence/study accommodations. Married fellows with children will be provided a housing allowance in lieu of quarters at the academy.
