Some flu shot recipients need booster for protection

The University's swine flu inoculation program is not over yet. Dr. Avarad Long, director of the Student Health Center, said Friday all 18 to 25-year-olds who have received swine flu inoculations will require booster shots.

"HEW (the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare) has told us that we're gonna have to give booster shots to all 18 to — but not including — 25-year-olds who received swine flu shots," Long said. The booster shots, he said, will probably be given on campus during the week of Jan. 10, 1977.

"The shots have to be given within one month (of the initial inoculation)," Long said. Examination and holiday schedule, however, prevent the scheduling of a booster clinic before January.

The booster clinic, Long said, will be conducted very much like the University's two-week immunization clinic which ended Friday. It will be open for one week and booster shots will be given daily from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 4 p.m. Registered students will receive the booster shots free of charge.

About 5,000 faculty, staff and students have received swine flu shots.

Brass, chorale to perform

The University Brass Choir and the University Chorale will present a free concert Tuesday at 8 p.m. in Beall Concert Hall.

The brass choir will be featured during the first half of the program. After intermission, the two ensembles will perform together.

The choir will perform Giovanni Gabrielli's "Canzon Quarti Toni," "Leipzig Towers," by Paul Shahan; "A Latin Encounter," by Lennie Niehaus; and "Festive and Commemorative Music" by Johannes Brahms. "A Latin Encounter" was recorded earlier by the Brass Choir for demonstration purposes at the Chicago Music Educators meeting last year.

The two ensembles will perform the "Magnificat" by Andrea Gabrielli and "O Clap Your Hands" by Ralph Vaughan Williams. Organist Gary Laing will join the groups for the "Entrata Festiva" for chorus, organ and brass by Flor Peters.

The University Brass Choir is conducted by professor Ira Lee, and the University Chorale is conducted by professor H. Royce Saltzman.
