

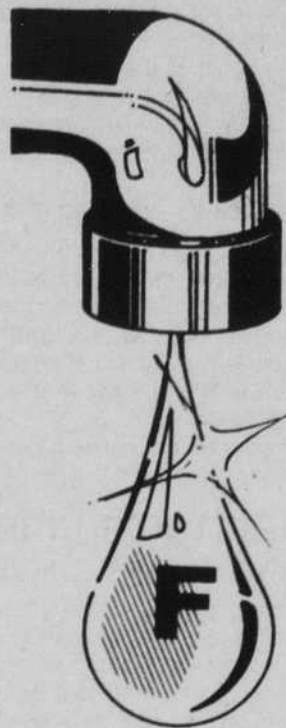
EWEB may fluoridate if opponents' case fails

Eugene's water may contain fluoride within two weeks, according to John Tiffany, Eugene Water and Electric Board (EWEB) president. That is, if all goes according to plan.

Eugene voters decided to allow the water to be fluoridated by accepting a ballot measure by a margin of 20,455 to 19,094. Tiffany says EWEB is waiting only for direction from the city council to begin fluoridating.

However, opponents to fluoridation have decided to challenge the fluoridation in court on the grounds that not all areas receiving the fluoridated water were allowed to vote on the ballot measure. Oakway, Santa Clara, River Road and Glenwood areas are served by the EWEB water system, but since EWEB is a municipal utility, persons in the outlying areas were not able to vote on it.

Citizens Against Fluoride, a recently-formed organization, will be attempting to have the ballot measure declared invalid, thereby stopping the scheduled addition of fluoride to the city's water.



Tiffany says that if the court case fails to reverse the decision to fluoridate Eugene's water, EWEB should be ready to fluoridate within two weeks. He adds that public notice will be given well in advance of the time fluoridation is begun.

County may build on armory site

The Armory popped up in the news again this week, but this time it was during a discussion of what to do with the site once the 62-year-old structure is completely torn down.

A Lane Council of Governments (L-COG) review committee decided Tuesday that the county should go ahead and apply for a \$4 million federal grant to construct a new community health building on the site, but agreed to include negative comments on the project in the application package.

Representatives of the Citizens' Committee to Save and Use the Armory said they wanted the fact that the Board of County Commissioners held no public hearings on the issue included in the application. However, committee representatives agreed that the county had the right to tear down its own buildings without public hearings — as specified under the

Home Rule Charter.

• Nobody testified at a public hearing held Tuesday by the Lane Regional Air Pollution Authority (LRAPA) and new indirect source regulations went into the books without a whimper.

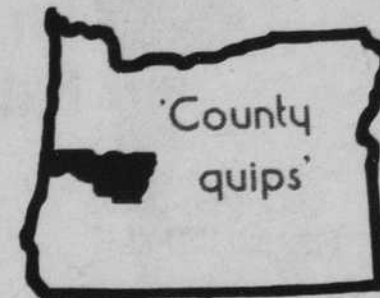
The new regulations, handed down by the state Environmental Quality Commission, raise the minimum size of a parking lot requiring a permit from 50 spaces to 250 spaces, but demand that cities make studies of traffic flow and parking patterns if there are complaints of pollution. If a city does not make these studies, it can be found in non-compliance and can be forced to undertake the job.

• The Lane County Board of Commissioners reviewed a proposed state legislative program Wednesday which includes issues supported by various groups in the county. The list outlines proposed county policy and, if approved, would be forwarded to local legislators in the next session.

The commissioners agreed to review the list and to make recommendations on the priorities at their Dec. 8 meeting.

A strong theme runs through many of the proposals; agencies in the county are asking for increased financial support from the state.

• Oregon's new motor vehicle code has had an impact on the local courts, County Chief Ad-



ministrator Robert Elfers said Wednesday.

The new regulations, in effect since July, make the District Court into a court of record and a source of unforeseen costs, he said. The Lane County Board of Commissioners then approved a supplemental budget of \$26,800 to help stem the tide.

• The Lane County Board of Commissioners granted permission Wednesday to employ two persons beyond the age of 65 — the mandatory retirement age. The employees are working in a federally-funded program for senior citizens which requires that seniors be hired to work in the project.

Dispute triggers nuclear probe

SEATTLE (AP) — A nuclear safety dispute that cost a Navy atomic reactor operator his job has set off a government probe of maintenance and safety precautions at the Navy's Idaho nuclear training facility.

Electronics technician 3.C. Alexander Williams alleges the Navy reactor, where naval personnel are trained to operate reactors like those on submarines and conventional craft, has been run in a shoddy manner.

Westinghouse operates and maintains the facility under a contract with the government.

Three persons died at the same reactor 16 years ago when it overheated and exploded. Although circumstances were different in the current episode, Williams has claimed the result might have been the same.
