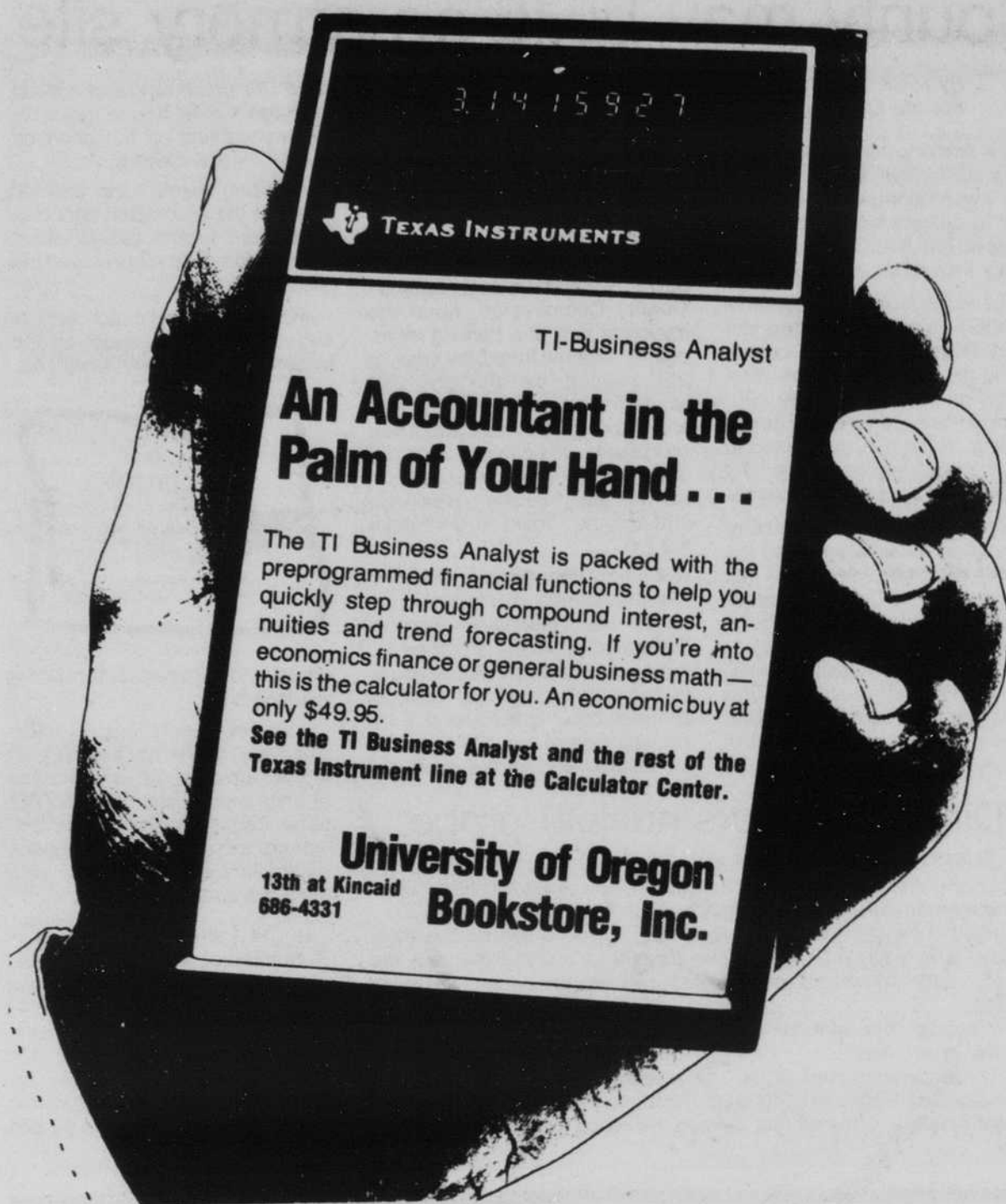

Israel warns Syrian troops

Israel warned Syria again Sunday that movement of Syrian troops into southern Lebanon would risk Israeli military action. The Israelis said they favored the idea of an "independent Lebanese force" to halt fighting between Lebanese Christians and Moslems in the area.

In Jerusalem, Israeli officials issued a communique saying that "any Syrian incursion south of their present deployment will only increase tension and create fresh hazards."

Study suggests solar energy

NEW YORK — Nuclear power plants will be less economical than coal-fired plants in the future because they must be shut down for maintenance and repair so often, a new study suggests.

And the efficiency of both types of plants is less than the utility industry says it is, making alternatives such as solar energy more attractive, the two-year study by the Council on Economic Priorities says.

Proponents of nuclear power traditionally have argued that it is cheaper than coal for generating electricity.

Teacher entitled to grow dope

WASHINGTON — A judge dismissed criminal charges Wednesday against a teacher who said he grew marijuana and smoked it to avoid going blind.

District of Columbia Superior Court Judge James A. Washington Jr. ruled that Robert C. Randall, 29, of Washington was entitled to the "defense of necessity" because marijuana had eased his glaucoma after other treatments proved ineffective.

No auction for Chavez college

MT. ANGEL, — The campus of Colegio Cesar Chavez will not be auctioned off Dec. 15 as was earlier reported, a Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) official has said in a letter to a college official.

"No date has been set for the sale of the property," said W. K. Cameron, director of HUD's office of property disposition in Washington, D.C., in a letter to Joseph Santana of Portland, a trustee of Colegio Cesar Chavez.

Prisoner exchange expected

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The United States and Mexico will sign a treaty Thursday agreeing to an exchange of prison inmates between the two countries, the U.S. Embassy announce.

The treaty will be initialed at the Mexican Foreign Ministry with U.S. Ambassador John J. Jova acting for the United States, the embassy spokesperson said Wednesday.

Before the first prisoners can be returned to their homelands, the treaty must be ratified by each country's Senate, and U.S. enabling legislation must be passed, the spokesperson added.

Reliable sources have said the earliest possible date for the first exchange, if the treaty is ratified and the necessary legislation passed, would be next April.

There are about 600 Americans

in Mexican jails, most on drug-related charges. The Mexican government has estimated 1,200 Mexicans are imprisoned in the United States.

One important part of the treaty, the sources said, would shield returning prisoners from further prosecution in their homelands on charges related to the case in which they were convicted.

That means an American intercepted in Mexico while trying to smuggle cocaine from South America to the United States — a common case — could not be charged with conspiracy or intent to import drugs into the United States, the sources said.

Nearly all the American prisoners here claim they were forced to sign confessions and suffered other judicial violations at the hands of the Mexicans.
