

## More shots, boosters coming

A make-up day for those who missed the November swine flu clinic is scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 9, in the Student Health Center. According to health center officials on campus this is the last chance to receive the monovalent swine flue vaccine.

Registered students over age 18, dependents of students over age 18, faculty and staff members can receive shots on this day between 8:30 and 11:30 a.m., and between 1 and 4 p.m.

The County Health Division advises those of ages 18 to 25 who have received their first shot of swine flue vaccine, to get a second booster.

They report that a field investigation shows half the people in this age category do not acquire immunity with only one shot, and therefore recommend a second shot.

Over 3,000 students who received inoculations during the campus clinic fall into this category, according to Ruth Atland, chief nurse at the student health center. Atland recommends people in the 18 through 24-year age group have a booster shot of swine flu vaccine to get effective antibody levels.

Booster shots will be available on Jan. 11 and 14 at the Student Health Center for those who received their first injections at the clinic in November and December.

## Traffic light marks new disposal site

The Lane County Department of Transportation cautions motorists using Franklin Boulevard east of Interstate 5, that a new traffic signal is in operation at the intersection of Franklin and Glenwood boulevards.

The light has been installed to assist traffic flow into and out of the county's solid waste center, which will open to the public on Wednesday.

## UO biologist gets grant for heart studies

The American Heart Association has selected University biologist Roderick Capaldi to receive one of its "established investigator" awards, which means the association will pay Capaldi's salary for the next five years so he can devote more time to basic scientific research.

The award is based on Capaldi's investigation of how membranes within the cells of heart tissue extract energy from foods. He is studying the precise structure of the membranes.

## Award-winning film shows tonight

The movie, "Mon Oncle Antoine," a French film with English subtitles which has won wide critical acclaim and 14 international film awards, will be shown at 7:30 tonight in Room 150, Geology.

The film, which is directed by Claude Jutra and produced by Marc Beaudet, deals with a young boy in a small Quebec community and how he views life through contacts with his Uncle Antoine who runs a general store.

The film is part of a University telecommunications course on the National Film Board of Canada. Its presentation is free.

the proposal had serious objections.

Objections were voiced during the meeting. They came from representatives of Women's Studies, Ethnic Studies, HEP, and Upward Bound.

While several objected to including Women's Studies in the proposed structure, others felt that the role of the dean was too broadly defined.

Jan Oliver, ASUO president, said that she basically supported the proposed plan, but shared the concern of the groups falling under the minority council.

Frances Scott, committee chair, also presented her personal report that would call for the hiring of several new deans to hold authority over "protected groups," as defined in the Oregon Laws, Chapter 204.

The committee first heard Scott's plan at Monday night's meeting and hasn't had time to consider it.
