

Fulbright-Hays international study awards available

The Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES) has announced the availability of awards offered by the Fulbright-Hays Opportunities Abroad Program for 1977-78. Inquiries and applications should be made as soon as possible.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens, have teaching experience (teaching opportunities), have a doctoral degree (research opportunities) and foreign language fluency in some instances.

CIES has established Jan. 3 as the deadline for this year's competition of NATO Research Fellowships for 1977-78. General interest areas include NATO's role in promotion of peace in Europe, pursuit of detente in east-west relations, economic problems in financing common defense, cooperation in arms procurement, parliamentary interaction among NATO countries, image of NATO, shared cultural values among

NATO countries and jurisprudential problems pertaining to certain aspects of allied cooperation.

Applicants must be nationals of member states of NATO, have sufficient language proficiency, have research experience and have established reputations in field of expertise. Doctorate, professional experience, and publications will be taken into consideration.

The award provides for a monetary sum of 23,000 Belgian francs a month (or equivalent). Grants will normally be for periods of 2 to 4 months, but in certain instances may be extended to 6 months.

Soviet historian views U.S. war

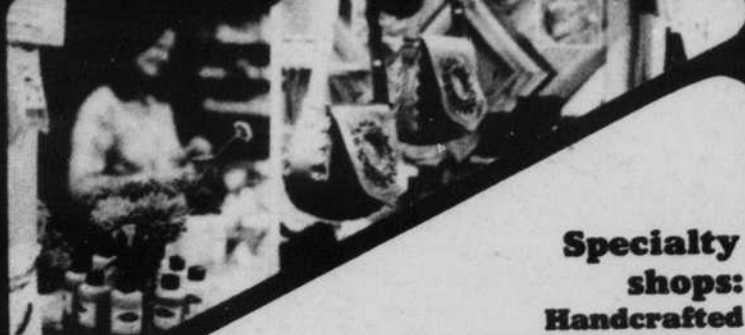
