...et al Local group marks Human Rights Day

A group of Eugeneans, working for the last three years to oppose violations of human rights, plans an information table on Friday in observance of Human Rights Day.

The Eugeneans are members of Amnesty International, a world-wide organization of individuals who conduct letter-writing campaigns on behalf of persons imprisoned for their beliefs.

The information table will be in front of the University's bookstore all day. A petition for the release of

100,000 prisoners will be circulated. Most of these people have been imprisoned without trial since 1965. Prisoner of Conscience seals, to be used on Christmas correspondence and other mail, will be available to alert citizens to the situation in Indonesia.

A similar information table will be conducted all day Saturday at the Saturday Market.

The Eugene chapter, comprised of 20 members, meets monthly to work for the release of persons jailed in Indonesia and

Brazil for their religious and/or political beliefs.

In addition, the Eugene chapter is involved in a worldwide campaign against torture. Olive Bowers, a local member, said that statements made by former prisoners testify to many "unspeakable" instances of torture.

Friday's information table commences Prisoner of Conscience year which has been called by Amnesty International as a year of action in behalf of prisoners of conscience.

Country singer performs in Portland

Tammy Wynette, "First Lady of Country Music," will be at the Portland Civic Auditorium stage for two shows, at 7 and 10 Thursday, Jan. 6.

The concert engagement is a benefit for the Mental Health Association of Oregon and tickets are on sale now at the Civic Auditorium, The Ticket Place at

Lipman's and all the usual outlets. Proceeds from the Portland concert will be used to help the Mental Health Association continue to provide Oregon communities with their many ongoing activities, as well as new programs planned for the future.

The Mental Health Association of Oregon is a non-profit, volunteer citizens' group, affiliated with the National Association for Mental Health.

Internationally recognized as America's foremost singer of country songs, Wynette is a four-time winner of the Country Music Association's top female vocalist award. She has also won three Grammys as the best female vocalist.

Joining the Wynette show and the Tennessee Gentlemen, as special guest, will be Monument recording artist Larry Gatlin. Gatlin, with several successful albums behind him, is currently enjoying Top Ten air play for his hit single, "Statues Without Arms."

KWAX broadcasts opera

The first Metropolitan Opera broadcast of Massenet's opera "Esclarmonde," presented live from the stage, will be broadcast at 11 a.m. Saturday on KWAX-FM, 91.1, the University's public radio station.

This will be the second opera broadcast of the 1976-77 Metropolitan Opera season.

Singing principal roles will be soprano Joan Sutherland as Esclarmonde; mezzo-soprano Huguette Tourangequ as Parseis; tenor Giacomo Aragall making his Met broadcast debut as the Chevalier Roland; baritone Louis Quilico as Bishop of Blois; bass Clifford Grant, also in his Met broadcast debut, as the Emporer Phorcas; bass John Macurdy as Cleomer, king of France, and tenor John Carpenter in another broadcast debut as Eneas.

Boyd entertains mothers
