Swine flu shots made available Thursday only

Students who missed the campus swine flu clinics in November can receive inoculations in the Student Health Center Thursday.

A special make-up day has been scheduled by the health center, and it will be the last chance for students, faculty and staff to receive the monovalent vaccine.

Registered students over age 18, dependents of students over age 18, faculty and staff members can receive shots between 8:30 and 11:30 a.m. and between 1 and 4 p.m.

Students between the ages of 18 and 25 who have already received the monovalent vaccine are urged to get a second booster shot.

A field investigation shows half the people in this age group do not acquire immunity with only one shot and the County Health Division recommends a second shot.

About 3,000 students who received their inoculations during the fall clinic are in this category, and health center officials recommend that they get a booster shot to insure effective antibody levels.

Booster shots will be available for four days beginning Jan 11 through Jan 14 for those who received their first injections at the clinic in November and December.

Movie features Black dramatist

The film "Lorraine Hansberry: the Black Experience in the Creation of Drama," will be shown tonight from 7 to 8:30 in 238 Gilbert. The showing is open to the public and admission is free.

Sponsored by the English department's Ethnic Studies Program, the film presents the life and work of America's leading black woman playwright, showing her importance as a playwright, a woman and a black.

Housing director needed

Students interested in directing the Off-Campus Housing Office must apply in EMU Suite 3 by Jan. 7.

Screened applicants will work 6 to 10 hours per week in the housing office to learn and be evaluated for the position winter term. Students can volunteer this time, use it as a work-study job, or perhaps arrange to receive credit for their internship through a professor.

The new director will be selected for spring term and the current director, Lois Hill, will assist him or her through June 10.

Minimum pay for the position is \$105 a month for 15 to 20 hours work each week, but this may increase.

A director on work-study is required to volunteer time if his money runs out before the end of the academic year, according to Hill.

"Money shouldn't be the reason this job attracts you," Hill says. "There are easier jobs which take less energy, pay more money and require less time."

Fishermen shop around

Commercial fishermen, towboatmen, and workboat operators from all over Oregon and Southern Washington will gather in the Portland Memorial Coliseum Assembly Hall Friday, Saturday and Sunday to attend this year's COMM/FISH/MART and Work Boat Show. Hours are noon to 7 p.m. all three days. Admission is free.

The show features the latest in gear, electronics, engines, machinery, hydraulics, refrigeration, equipment and services. Specialty manufacturers and distributors of all kinds will be in attendance. Boat builders, too, will be there to assist with plans for new construction, conversion or repair. The business orientation of the show has attracted firms which have not exhibited previously.

The show's purpose is to provide commercial vessel owners and operators with the convenience of conducting comparison shopping and other necessary business at one location and under one roof. Conceivably business can be completed in one afternoon which ordinarily would take days and weeks of running from place to place.

The show is an annual event which occurs at that time of year when most commercial vessels are idle.

Author of monographs on the neo-Freudian concepts of Erich Fromm and on avant-garde tendencies in contemporary Protestantism, Dobrenkov is in the United States on a three-month research grant to study philosophical aspects of contemporary Protestant theology.

His presentation is co-sponsored by the political science department and the Russian and East European Studies Center.

Interested persons are invited to attend.

Richard Lichtman of the Wright Institute in Berkeley will speak on "Marx and Freud: Politics or Therapy?" at 3 p.m. Thursday in Room 72, PLC. His lecture is part of the sociology department's colloquium series and is free to the public.

Lichtman is currently on the editorial board of the Socialist Revolution journal, is researching the relationship between unemployment and mental illness and is writing a book on theories of Marx and Freud.
