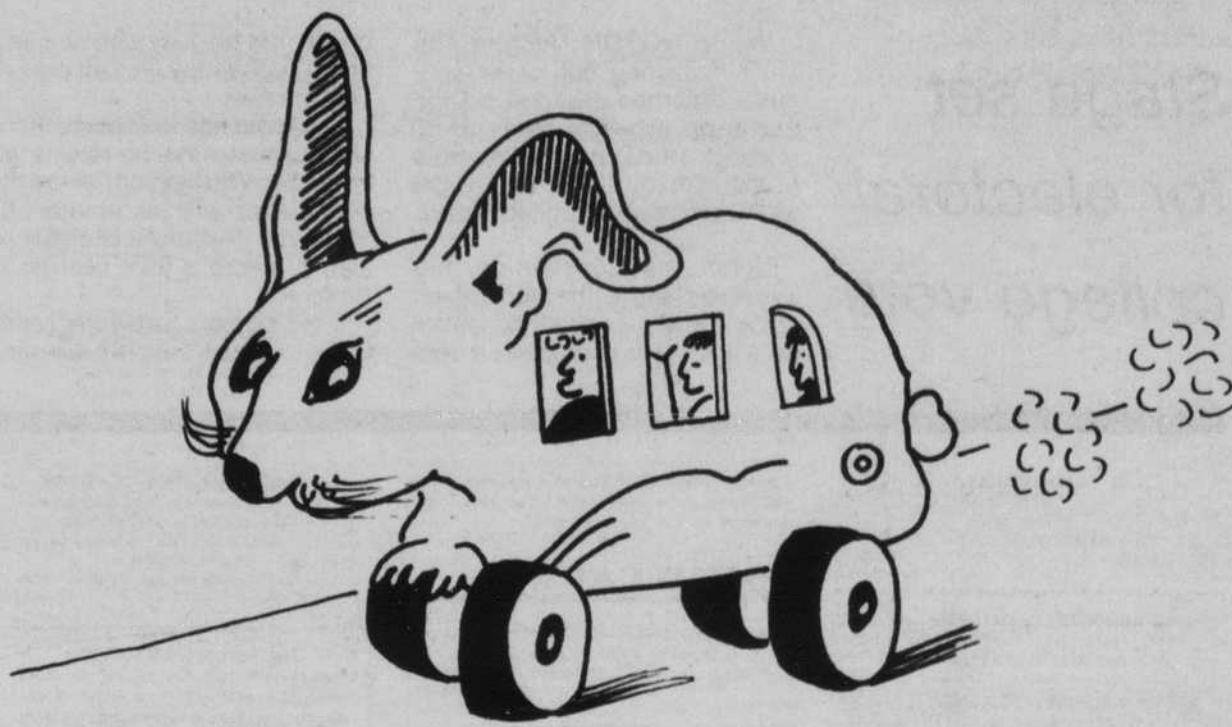

the International Church of World Community Consciousness.

The philosophy behind the organization, then called the magic bus, was real, according to Joseph. "The idea was to take people on retreats in the direction they wanted to go, and to let them look at our religion at the same time." The drivers of the buses were also religious ministers.

The religion achieved recognition in 50 states, according to Joseph. But last year, when courts began to question the legality of running a bus line under the auspices of a church, the International Church of World Community Consciousness disbanded and the Grey Rabbit went underground.

Today, because the Grey Rab-

bit is not registered with the Interstate Commerce Commission, it does not have to comply with the regulations that cause fares to be high. In order to remain exempt from these restrictions the Grey Rabbit cannot officially exist.

"We are completely decentralized," said Joseph. "The drivers own their own buses and I act as a referral agent, connecting people who want to travel with individual bus owners."

Although Joseph denies it, there is evidence to suggest the invisible hand of Wall is still controlling Grey Rabbit. "The buses are registered in our names, but they really belong to Lester," explained one driver.

The Grey Rabbit buses on first viewing are as fantastic as the Grey Rabbit organization. Outside they appear much the same as the common Greyhound bus, but with blank side panels. The inside of the bus, however, adds the pink to the elephant. It is converted into one large bed. All seats, except two for smokers and one for the driver, have been removed, and replaced by dozens of overlapping mattresses to give passengers a comfortable, fluffy ride. The bathroom has also been removed.

"Better than a Greyhound?" said one student on her way to New York. "Just look around, it's unreal."

A bearded passenger on his way to San Francisco had similar feelings. "I couldn't afford to take this trip if I had to take Greyhound or the train," he intoned sitting on a mattress and taking a drink from his bottle of beer. "I don't know how they do it but I like it."

According to driver Bob Knee, the passenger's enthusiasm for the bus usually begins to wane toward the end of the three day trip. "It's a long time to be on a bus," he said.

The Eugene branch of Grey Rabbit is run out of Leon's truck and diesel station by the Eugene coordinator, Fred. According to Fred, Grey Rabbit was centered in Eugene for several years before transferring its operation base to San Francisco.

"Demand for the Grey Rabbit here is big, but it is mostly north-bound," he said. "We get 30 people on a bus, usually students from the University, around Christmas."

The next "regular, unscheduled bus" leaving for San Francisco and New York will be on Dec. 19. At the end of December, the service mysteriously vanishes until spring.

According to Fred, those willing to believe in the Grey Rabbit may either reserve a place through Leon's, phone 746-9691, or wait in the bar of the 4th Street Depot restaurant.

Cassidy dies in blaze

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jack Cassidy, whose entertainment career took him from Broadway musicals to film and television roles, died Sunday when flames and smoke engulfed his penthouse apartment, a coroner's spokesman said.

Cassidy's badly burned body was discovered in a room of the fourth-floor apartment early Sunday. His wallet was found nearby. Investigators said the scene was littered with cigarette butts apparently left from a Saturday night party.
