Meetings study time planning

Service funds available

The joint Lane County-City of Eugene program of revenue sharing for social services is now taking applications. Some \$300,000 has been set aside by the two governments to supply money for social service agencies providing services to citizens within the two jurisdictions.

The program, which was started in 1973, currently involves 20 public and non-profit private agencies operating 26 different

programs. Deadline for submitting applications is Jan. 21.

Foreign politics talk set

Sociologist Maurice Zeitlin, an observer of American business and Latin American politics, will discuss multinational corporations and Chilean politics Friday in two guest talks at the University.

Zeitlin, a professor of sociology at the University of California at Los Angeles, will explore "Class and Managerial Views of the Large Corporation," an analysis of the politics and economics of multinational corporations, in a 3:30 p.m. talk.

At 8 p.m., he will speak on "Allende's Chile: What We Can Learn?" The talk will focus on the problems of Chile's socialist gov-

ernment from 1970 to 1973.

Both talks will be held in Room 204, Condon Hall. Admission is free and the public is invited to attend.

Zeitlin is the author of several books. He visited Chile during the administration of Marxist Pres. Salvador Allende and is currently writing a book on the Allende government and its overthrow by a military coup. His 3:30 p.m. talk is being cosponsored by the University departments of economics, history, political science and sociology. The New American Movement is sponsoring the evening program.
