

Hearing slated for code

A public hearing will be held at the University Thursday, Jan. 27 to consider a proposed administrative rule that would revise the University's Student Conduct Code.

The hearing, open to all interested parties, will begin at 3:30 p.m. in Room 215, Allen Hall and will be conducted by journalism assistant professor Jack Hart, chairer of the University's Ad Hoc Student Conduct Committee.

The code provides regulations, policies and procedures governing student life at the University. It is intended to inform students of their rights and responsibilities and to provide general guidance for enforcement of rules and regulations.

The ad hoc committee has proposed that certain portions be revised to eliminate legal and procedural problems that have been experienced in recent years. The major revision would abolish the student court system and replace it with an optional enforcement procedure. Options would include administrative resolution of problems, resolution by a hearing by an informal referee or a formal hearing.

A draft of the proposed revision may be examined any weekday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the office of the University President, Room 110, Johnson Hall; Office of the Assistant to the President for Legal Affairs, Room 319, Law Center; Office of the President of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon, Suite 4, EMU; Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs, Room 110, Johnson Hall; Office of Student Conduct, Room 472, Oregon Hall; or the Library reference desk.

Interested parties may submit written comments by 5 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 20 to Hart, Room 311C, Allen Hall.

The 9-foot by 21-foot kiosk, located between Montgomery Ward and Mr. K's restaurant, officially opened Dec. 15 for a three-month trial basis as approved by the college's Board of Education. The booth will be open during the hours the shopping center is open for business.

Services at the booth include information about the college, its courses and programs, career information (including a computer terminal which does an analysis of possible career choices based on an individual's interests and skills) and registration for winter term classes.

LCC Pres. Eldon Schafer explains the purpose of the booth as being "the first time during my seven years we've had the enrollment flexibility to reach off campus to provide opportunities to those who would not or could not come to LCC."

New prof heads program

Effie Fairchild, associate professor of recreation and park management, and 1975 winner of the University's Ersted Award for Distinguished Teaching, has been appointed new director for the University's summer vacation college. She will succeed director Grace Graham, who retired last summer.

The new director has been a member of the UO faculty since 1970. In her new post, she will administer one of the nation's first summer school programs combining study and recreation.

Vacation College allows adults to spend a week of their summer vacation going to school at the University. Participants spend half days studying with guest faculty and the remainder of each day in informal discussion and recreation. The program has no examinations or admission requirements.

Marking its 14th year this summer, Vacation College will hold its next session Aug. 14 to Aug. 21. This year the program also will offer its first Family Vacation College from July 17 to July 22.

Chilean committee meets

The Eugene Committee for a Free Chile will hold its second meeting at 7 tonight in the Koinonia Center, 1414 Kincaid St.

The focus of the committee will be educational programs and events about Chile and the involvement of the United States government and corporations in Chile and throughout Latin America. The committee will also be working on support for Chilean refugees in the United States.

At the founding meeting the committee agreed that "in view of the interconnectedness of the situation in Latin America the committee will not restrict its work exclusively to Chile."

The hearing is sponsored by the City of Eugene Commission on the Rights of the Youth. For more information on commission activities, call Jay Bolton, 687-5010.

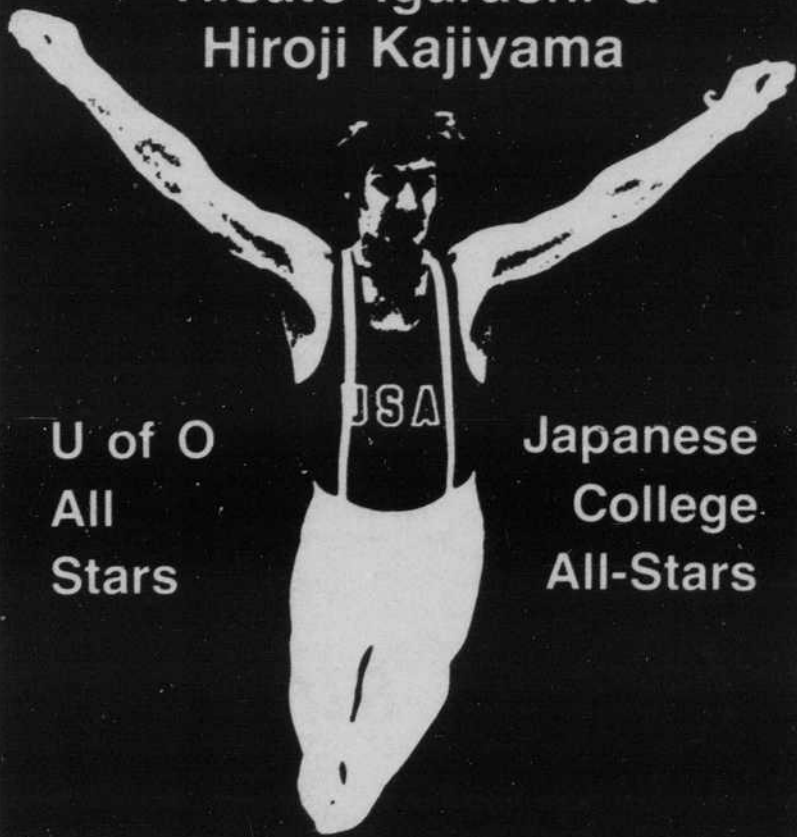
Photograms displayed
