Author to talk on child's play

"How to Change the Games Children Play" is the title of a workshop scheduled for Jan. 21 and 22 at Gerlinger Annex on campus.

Don Morris, the controversial author, researcher and professor (Montana State University), will direct the workshop. Morris is currently the subject of much discussion among physical educators, elementary classroom teachers, recreational leaders, educational psychologists and teachers of exceptional children. He advocates the importance of games as a factor influencing behavior and as an educational tool.

The workshop is sponsored by the University's Phi Epsilon Kappa and the Eugene Education Association. Registration fee is \$3 and one textbook is required. Dorothy Bergquist, soprano, James Miller, tenor, and Helen Miller, piano, will present selections from the "Italian Songbook" by Hugo Wolf at 3:30 p.m. Sunday in Beall Concert Hall.

The concert consists of 20 selections from the "Italian Songbook." The movements have

been arranged to suggest a dialogue between a man and woman.

Bergquist received her bachelors degree in voice from Mannes College in New York City in 1956. Since then she has taught voice at various music schools. Locally, she has sung the lead in "Suzannah," presented by the University Theatre, and soloed for the Eugene Symphony.

James Miller has been a professor at the School of Music for the past 12 years. He earned his masters and doctoral degrees at the University of Michigan. His wife, Helen, will assist the vocalists on piano. She also studied at Michigan, receiving bachelors and masters degrees in piano performance.

The trio will present the same program at Willamette University in Salem on January 16.

Admission to the concert is free.
