

New subcommittee to monitor legislation

Throughout the upcoming state legislative session, the city of Eugene will be monitoring legislation which may affect city policies.

The city council has appointed a legislature subcommittee to keep abreast of bills and committee ac-

tion in the Legislature. The subcommittee consists of three council members and a special legislature liaison. The liaison will attend meetings in Salem and then report to the subcommittee, which will then bring items of interest before the full council.

Paget Engen, the legislature liaison, says the council may de-

cide to send persons to Salem to testify before committee hearings if the city council feels some expression of its views should be made. She adds that city staff members may testify if more technical items arise.

Engen says no specific goals have been discussed as yet, and items will probably be considered as they come up in the Legisla-

ture. She adds, however, that she is preparing an informational memorandum of items she feels may be of continuing interest to the council.

Some of the items she says she is including in the memo are following Sen. Edward Fadeley's (D-Eugene) Committee on Intergovernmental Relations; any legislation dealing with Senate Bill 100, which calls for land use planning, and legislation dealing with state revenue sharing.

Council members Eric Haws, Tom Williams and Brian Obie have been appointed to the council's subcommittee, but no regular meetings have been scheduled as yet.

Williams says that although the

city staff has not yet come up with specific proposals for what the city should be looking for at the Legislature, "obviously one of the key issues is the governor's revenue sharing plan." This plan would provide state revenue sharing for counties and cities. Williams adds "There are a myriad of other kinds of issues" that the city is concerned about.

Williams also said the outcome of the school finance question would be of interest to the city, as well as the possibility of extending workmen's compensation to government employees.

Williams said the subcommittee would be lobbying "as much as we can" on these and other issues.

Obie and Haws were unavailable for comment.

Washington students play energy-environment game

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — "Stop the years," the frustrated student cried out as he grappled with the deadly serious problem of dwindling energy, environmental degradation and maintaining an acceptable quality of life.

Seemingly, the best one could hope for in the game was a tie with time.

The game was played out recently in Mitch Billings' sixth-grade class at Brookdale School here. The students were playing with something called an Energy-Environment Simulator developed by the Energy Research and Development Administration.

The device is a computer which simulates real world conditions. By turning dials on the console or small remote panels, participants control energy and environmental conditions. It translates decisions and commands into new conditions as time races by at the rate of a century a minute.

Dials control the use of energy sources coal, oil, natural gas, hydroelectric and nuclear power. Other dials control population, transportation, industry, quality of life, pollution and new technology.

Their interplay projects resource use, energy demands, environmental effects and population growth rates. Warning lights and buzzers announce shortages of energy supplies and environmental damage.

The object of the game, as it is in reality, is to balance energy, demand, environment and quality of life.

The first time through, oil and natural gas disappeared quickly. There were shouts of, "Turn up the coal," and, "More hydroelectric," but most forgot about "re-

search and development" and curtailment of transportation and home appliance use.

By the third try the students had learned to stabilize the situation a little. Air pollution was bad, there was nuclear waste to deal with and the quality of life was down, but the balances were maintained.

The best they managed was to hold off disaster 600 years.

Principal developer of the simulator was Dr. John Amend, a graduate of Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma and now a pro-

fessor of chemistry at Montana State University.

PLU is sharing the machine with Seattle's Pacific Science Center, the University of Washington and Bellevue Community College.

Dr. John Herzog, chairman of the Division of Natural Sciences at PLU and project director, encouraged simulator demonstrations and workshops for local organizations, clubs and school groups.

The hope is that participants will learn much more quickly the interrelationships of energy, environment and quality of life and become emotionally involved as well.
