

Food drying class opens

Registration still is open for the home food dryer class offered winter term at Lane Community College.

Students in the class will assemble their own home food dryer from pre-cut parts and learn food drying techniques, recipes and safety operating factors. At the close of the class, each student will take home a food dryer.

The class will meet from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 15, 22 and 29 in the woodshop, which is the Industrial Tech building.

Tuition is \$6 with a supply fee of \$58 necessary to complete the food dryer project. Interested students may attend the first class sessions or sign up in the Community Education office.

Most food can be dried including fruits, vegetables, meats and fish.

Rabies vaccine offered

Special rabies inoculation clinics have been set for Saturday in Lane County.

According to Dr. Joseph Kipp, chairer of the Lane County Veterinary Medical Association Rabies Committee, the clinics will be held in the firehalls in Oakridge and Creswell. Clinics in Eugene, Springfield, Cottage Grove and Junction City will be held in the offices of the local veterinarians.

Rabies clinics for cats and dogs will be held from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. The Tri-Agency Dog Control Authority will license dogs at the courthouse from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday and in Springfield at 447 North A St. from 1 to 5 p.m.

Cost of the rabies shot will be \$4, about half the usual charge. The County Veterinary Association is holding the clinics as a public service, Kipp said.

Dogs that are six months of age are old enough to receive the rabies vaccination. The vaccination for dogs is good for three years.

Clinic requests 'quitters'

Have you tried to quit smoking during the last year, managed to stay away from cigarettes at least two weeks, then found yourself smoking again?

If so, researchers for the Oregon Smoking Control Project on campus would like to talk with you. The project will pay \$3 for a one-hour interview about your experiences while you were a "quitter" and what happened when you started smoking again.

Ed Lichtenstein, psychology professor and head of the Clinical Training Program, is conducting the project and has received a \$5,000 grant from the National Heart and Lung Association. The study began in October 1976 with an appeal for smokers who had tried to quit. Although the Smoking Control Project interviewers talked to many Eugene-Springfield area residents, they need more volunteers.

"We need more information and more subjects," said Dave Antonuccio, a University graduate student in psychology. "It's hard to find the right people to interview because we have such specific guidelines."

The study is aimed at discovering why people resume smoking, and at learning about their experiences while not smoking and after resumption of smoking. Project results will be used in treatment programs for people who want to quit smoking.

Ski registration gears up

Registrations are now being taken for another "Get Fit to Ski" series at the Eugene Family YMCA, 2055 Patterson St. The class will meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 7 to 8 p.m. It will last eight weeks, beginning Jan. 18.

This session is for either downhill or cross-country skiers. Emphasis for half of each class will be on cardio-vascular development for endurance and stamina. During the other half it will be on the development of muscular strength and joint flexibility.

Grant will support elderly

Lane County's Senior Services Program recently received a grant from ACTION to develop a project for 55 senior companions. So far 35 people have responded to the program. Twenty more are needed.

The program will provide people 60 years of age and older with the experience of developing a person-to-person relationship with other seniors in need of companionship. Senior companions will work 20 hours a week in such areas as senior centers and nursing homes.

To be eligible for the senior companion program, seniors must be at least 60 years old, with income under \$3,000 a year for singles and \$3,900 for couples, physically able to work 20 hours a week, meet screening criteria set by program, and participate in four hours of training.

Senior companions will receive \$140 per month, tax free.
