

Economic seminar slated

The League of Women Voters of Central Lane County will meet Thursday at 9:15 a.m. to discuss the topic, "Toward a Global Partnership: The Economic Challenge."

Speakers will be Daniel Goldrich, a University political science professor; Julia Friedman, Robert Smith and Barry Siegal, all faculty members of the University's economics department, and James Fitch, an agricultural economist from Oregon State University. Their lectures will cover historical background, trade and technology transfer problems, international debt and arid farming in Tunisia and Turkey.

Wilber McCollum, forest engineer from the Weyerhaeuser office in Tacoma, Wash., will be the luncheon speaker and will give a slide presentation of Weyerhaeuser operations in Indonesia.

After lunch, league members will meet in special session to take consensus of the discussed issues.
